

ORCHARD HAD A MURDER MANIA, DEFENSE CLAIMS

Confession Shows He Was Strongly Moved at Times to Kill, Says Richardson.

BOISE, July 22.—Resuming his summing up for the defense in the Haywood case today Mr. Richardson reverted to the Bradley explosion in San Francisco briefly, to call attention to the testimony of a witness who said Orchard declared "Bradley got what was coming to him, and that a chap named Steinberg who is going to sue him."

Tracing Orchard back to Denver, where he made the second attempt on the life of Gov. Peabody, Mr. Richardson declared that absolutely no corroborative had been offered to Orchard's story of setting the bomb under a sidewalk and its failure to explode because of a coal can driving across the wire. The attorney also declared that no sufficient explanation had been offered as to why Orchard abandoned from time to time the attempts on the lives of Gov. Peabody, Judge Goddard and Gabbart, Sherman Bell and Heesne.

Had Mania to Kill. "Do you suppose, gentlemen of the jury," asked Mr. Richardson, "that if a murderous inner circle of the Western Federation of Miners had marked these men for death and had hired someone to do their work they would have done so easily and without apparent cause derived from carrying out their design? Do you imagine they would stop until their purpose had been accomplished?"

"When you consider all the testimony in this case I think you will reach with me the conclusion that this man Orchard was possessed of a mania to go out and kill. Sometimes he just was greater than at others, and so it was that sometimes he was strong in his purposes and sometimes wavering.

His testimony shows a desultory, uncalculated method of pursuing the victims selected for death for some fancied grievance against himself or perhaps the organization in which he belonged. Why, gentlemen, even Vaughn, the insurance agent, who traveled with Orchard, slept with him and knew him as well as anybody could, tells you that Orchard's talk at times made him think the man was a nut.

Orchard's is the most absurd story on the face of the earth. He says there was never a cent paid amount to be paid him for given crimes—he was almost invariably told not to take too much, and he could get as much as he wanted it. In the light of this testimony, what becomes of Hawley's opening statement that the Western Federation of Miners had some of the prizes for crime, so much being fixed for the murder of a Governor, so much for a judge and so much for a common laborer?"

Richardson called attention to the numerous instances of Orchard's testimony when he appeared as a witness, and concluded in scornful voice: "Will you tell the jury what a halter about the neck of this man on such testimony as this and send him to his death at the behest of the Mine Owners' Association and its representative? It will be a long time, I tell you, before the law will sanction a conviction on any such evidence as has been here adduced."

Richardson ridiculed Orchard's story as being ordered "to get" David H. Moffatt, President of the First National Bank of Denver, and stated that Haywood deposited all the funds of the Federation in this bank and was a constant visitor to the bank.

Gives the Lie to All. "I think of that man, and yet this creature covered with the stings of his great crimes, coming here and would have you believe that Haywood was planning to commit murder on the man to whom he was intrusting the funds of the organization of which he was secretary and treasurer—upon David H. Moffatt, with whom he was on terms of almost intimate friendship. Everything connected with this matter gives the lie to Orchard's monstrous story."

Richardson next pointed out how easy it would have been for Orchard to have killed Gen. Sherman Bell had it been so desired.
