

CITIES OF FLATS ARISE ON OUTER EXPRESS LINES

New Houses This Year Will Give Better Homes to 150,000.

MASSES FOR BROOKLYN.

Small Dwelling Builders Are Forced Toward Residential Periphery.

Flat-house homes for 150,000 persons will be built in the nearer rapid transit suburbs this year.

Builders are getting ready for a big outflow of flat dwellers from Manhattan through the new subways.

Most of the new houses are of the four-story type. They are planned with wide, large rooms because the land does not cost more than a fifth of what similarly accessible land is worth in Manhattan.

Sections to be opened by the three new subways under the rivers are the centers of such flat house operations.

Those sections were vacant and inaccessible before the subway was built.

In three years flat builders put up thousands of houses. Now they have a dense population, with stores and other city necessities.

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HUGHES CERTAIN THE COUNTRY IS SAFE AND SOUND

War on Evils That Menace Will Only Make It Stronger, the Governor Declares.

CHAUTAUQUA, N. Y., Aug. 24.—Gov. Hughes paid a fine tribute to the American people in an address before the Chautauqua Assembly this afternoon.

The Governor, wholly optimistic, declared his confidence in the country's ability to pass safely through any crisis it may invite for its betterment.

Gov. Hughes summed up his views in the following: "Let there be no vague fears about the outcome. I place full confidence in the society and integrity of motive of the American people."

"I believe that with an increasing proportion of true representation, with increasing and discriminating public discussion, with the patient application of sound judgment to the consideration of public measures, and with the inflexible determination to end abuses and to purify the administration of government of self-interest, we shall realize a greater prosperity and a wider diffusion of the blessings of free government than we have ever hitherto been able to enjoy."

"Morals Never So Sound." "I believe that the moral standards of the American people were never more sound than they are to-day. Considering the tremendous increase in the opportunities for wrongdoing, the seductive and refined temptations and the materialistic appeals that are incident to our present mode of life, and the material comforts which invention and commerce have made possible, I believe that the manner in which the ethical development of the people has kept pace with their progress in other directions may fairly be called extraordinary."

"Care in making laws and firmness and impartiality in executing them are the securities of our peace. Laziness, inattention or vacillating administration not only causes disaster, but inevitably leads to ignorant and extravagant demands. Strong, even-tempered and dignified administration, respect and by the very certainty of its operation, conserves the public confidence. In this way alone can we secure so far as possible to give each individual a fair chance to put a step in improvement of the government to restrict the area of opportunity."

"The first is the abuse of the freedom allowed for individual effort. This is illustrated by concerted attempts on the part of the government to secure a strong position to put others at disadvantage by unfair means. It is the business of the government to secure the use of such franchises for the public benefit."

"There is also the abuse of the system of government itself by prostituting representative powers to selfish advantage."
