## FLANAGAN WINS, BUT INJURES MAN THROWING HAMMER

### Judge Walsh, of the Pastime Club, Has Leg Broken--New York Athletes Make a Great Showing at Jamestown.

**JAMESTOWN, Sept. 7.**—A crowd that taxed the capacity of the exposition athletic field assembled this afternoon to witness the events in the senior championships of the Amateur Athletic Union. All the men entered were in fine fettle and everybody was looking for record-breaking feats.

**John Flanagan**, of the Irish-American Athletic Club, won the 16-pound hammer event from his rival, McGrath, of the New York Athletic Club.

On Flanagan's last throw the wire handle of the hammer broke and the lead ball fell off at tangent. John J. Walsh, of the Pastime Club, New York, the judge, was standing just behind the circle, only fifteen feet away. The hammer head struck him on the right leg half way between knee and ankle, breaking the bone with a snap that could be heard over the grand stand. Walsh was knocked down. Rolling over he tried to jump up but the broken leg doubled under him.

"It's gone," exclaimed Walsh, sitting down again. "Get me a doctor."

A physician ran on the spot and immediately the injured man calmly directed operations and was assisted from the field.

This throw of Flanagan was the last in the whole competition. Capt. Percy L. Jones, surgeon United States Army, attended Mr. Walsh and says that he has a compound fracture of the right leg, between knee and ankle. It can be set without trouble and will heal in several weeks.

Flanagan broke the world's record with the 6-pound weight, with a throw of 33 feet 3 inches.

Melville Sheppard, of the Irish-American Athletic Club, New York, set the crowd wild by winning the half mile dash in 1:16 1/2.

Owing to the confusion concerning the club showing in yesterday's junior events the officials of the meet issued an announcement this afternoon. The New York Athletic Club scored 47 points and the Irish-American Club 45 points.

H. H. Huff, Chicago Athletic Association, won the 100-yard run, defeating Tom Kelly, of the University of Oregon, the former champion, and Charles Parsons, of the Olympic Club, San Francisco.

The 100-yard run was easily won by M. W. Sheppard, Irish-American Athletic Club, New York City, the present champion for this distance. Andrew Garner, of the Olympic Club, San Francisco, second; Frank C. Sheehan, of South Boston, Mass., third, time, 1m. 55.4s.

In the 500-yard shotput Ralph Rose, Olympic Club, of California, broke the world's record by half an inch. His put was 49 feet 6 1/2 inches. W. W. Coe, Boston, A. A. C., was second, with 48 feet 2 inches. W. Gilmore, Olympic, third, with 47 feet 1 inch.

The 150-yard hurdle went to Forest Smithson, Oregon; A. B. Shaw, of Chicago, was second, and W. R. McCullough, of the N. Y. A. C., third; time, 1:13.5 seconds.

One-Mile Run—James P. Sullivan, Irish-American A. C., won in a canter, 8:4. Rogers, N. Y. A. C., second; Charles Bacon, Irish-American A. C., third. Time, 4 minutes, 23 seconds. Former time, 4 minutes, 24 1/2 seconds.

**WORCESTER, Mass., Sept. 7.**—Because some of the concessionaires of the New England Fair "Midway" put on tents on Sunday, the Rev. Orson E. Mallory prayed for rain to spoil the fair's business.

The officials, who admit the fair will cost a \$4,000 loss, are very unhappy. The farmers and the general public, disappointed at not being able to see the fair, are criticizing the official petition for rain. The concessionaires, who sold for ground privileges, whose work last Sunday in getting their tents and booths ready called down the wrath of Mr. Mallory, are also disturbed.

Mr. Mallory says he did pray for rain and is glad of it.

### WINS FIFTEEN-MILE SWIM.

**LONDON, Sept. 7.**—The British champion swimmer, J. A. Jarvis, easily won a fifteen-mile race to-day on the Thames, from Richmond to Blackfriars Bridge, in which most of the British and Continental experts competed. P. Charles Bacon, Irish-American A. C., was second and J. Mass, the champion of Belgium, was third. There were thirty-three starters.
