TRIED TO SHOOT PERCY NAGLE IN BIG PARK ROW SKYSCRAPPER

Tammany Leader on Whom Pistol Was Drawn To-day



PERCY NAGLE

Follower of Burke, Who Was Beaten by Dietz in Primary Fight of Tuesday, Brings Dramatic Close to Political Argument.

WEAPON WAS PRESSED AGAINST BIG MAN'S NECK

Trigger Was Pulled, but the Cartridge Failed to Explode, and Nagle Seized the Revolver—The Police Heard Nothing About It.

An attempt was made on the life of Tammany Leader Percy Nagle this afternoon in the corridor of the Park Row Building.

Nagle received rumors that Burke was "looking for him." The big fellow did not run away, but he kept a good sized following with him wherever he went.

This afternoon Nagle and his friends were standing in the corridor of the Park Row Building when Burke entered with a number of followers.

THE ENEMIES GET TOGETHER. "Oh, there you are, you big —," Burke is reported to have begun.

"No, I wouldn't sit down with you, you big stiff," Burke's answer is said to have been, and with that he is said to have struck Nagle a punch in the neck.

Nagle's friends were closing in and the big fellow was keeping his temper very poorly in control, when one of Burke's adherents passed him a revolver, crying, "Shoot the dub!"

"No, I won't do it that way," said Burke, waving it back.

CARTRIDGE DIDN'T EXPLODE. "I'll do it myself, then," shouted the excited Burke follower, jabbing the muzzle of the gun into Nagle's neck and pulling the trigger.

A loud click was the only result. Nagle turned white, but grabbed the revolver.

The crowd surged in, surrounded and screened the combatants, and then suddenly dispersed.

Not a policeman had heard anything about it when an Evening World reporter arrived at the Park Row Building. But in the corridor and Haan's barroom the atmosphere buzzed with the talk of the fight.

In the excitement nobody had seen which way Burke went or which way Nagle had vanished.

Nobody seemed to know the name of the man who had prodded the revolver into Nagle's neck.

SAYS NAGLE WAS "HEELED." According to an acquaintance who saw Burke as he was hastily leaving, Burke claims to have struck Nagle in self-defense.

How Nagle, who is a vigorous fighter, refrained from "mixing it" is a mystery to those who know him. The explanation given by some is that Burke had too big a crowd with him and Nagle kept cool to prevent a free-for-all.

The man who snapped the weapon, according to one man who saw the mix up, was a smooth shaven man, about 5 feet 8 inches tall, dressed in dark gray suit and derby hat. The glimpse of him was fleeting, and the other members of the party closed in around the two.
