

GIRL IS THROWN UNDER TRAIN BY MAN IN A HURRY

Mamie McQuade Terribly Mangled by Locomotive on Death Avenue.

LEG OFF, ARM BROKEN.

Priest Hastens to Scene and Gives Last Rites Before Ambulance Arrives.

Many things conspired with a man in a hurry to crush Mamie McQuade, nine-year-old, of No. 512 West Twenty-ninth street, who is in Bellevue Hospital to-day with her left leg cut off, her right arm broken and torn until it probably will have to be amputated, and internal injuries which may cause her death. She was struck and held fast in the pilot of a New York Central freight engine last night at Thirtieth street and Tenth avenue and dragged half a block.

It is said there was no watchman at the crossing, that the engine was making a "back" and that a man in a hurry to cross the tracks, knocked the girl directly in front of the locomotive. Then when at last a call was sent to Roosevelt Hospital for an ambulance it was forty-five minutes before it came. After it did come it took Miss McQuade to Bellevue.

The girl works in a chocolate factory in Thirtieth street and was going home after her day's work. She was standing near the railroad track with a number of other girls employed in the factory. They had all seen the freight coming and were waiting for it to pass. While they were chatting a man, whose identity the police are to-day trying to

learn, came with long strides and elbowed his way through the little crowd of young women, showing them right and left. Miss McQuade was nearest the track. The hurrying man did not take the trouble to push her aside. He simply ran over her.

With a jump the man cleared the front of the engine and escaped across the rails. The girl fell only a few inches before the pilot, which caught her dress.

She screamed madly as the rushing engine dragged her over the cinders and ties, and her companions followed down the track, yelling at the engineer to stop.

At last he did stop, and then calmly climbed out of his cab and went home. He is said to be George Menker, of No. 25 Bergoline avenue, Union Hill, N. J.

The Rev. Father McQuade, a priest from the Carmelite Church, in Twenty-eighth street, was sent for and came as fast as he could run, for he was told the girl was dying, and administered the last rites of the Catholic Church.

Dr. Gordon Lindsey, who was in the belated ambulance, worked with a will when he reached the victim. He has her more serious injuries. Miss McQuade has many bruises and cuts on her body and face.

HE WHIPPED BOTH TWINS TO PUNISH THE BAD ONE.

Albert on arriving where the red balloon was, inhaled it and sent it sailing into the air. Mrs. Mary Knightlinger, mother of the boys, preferred charges against her son for assault and battery. The case will be heard this evening.

TO FIGHT JEROME VERDICT.

Hearing on Libel Case Set Down for Tuesday Next.

The case of Frank E. Xavier, proprietor and editor of the *Yonkers Herald*, who was found guilty by a jury on Oct. 3 of criminally libeling District Attorney Jerome, came up yesterday afternoon before County Judge William T. Platt at White Plains.
