

AIDED WIFE IN SUICIDE PACT, LIVED FOR TRIAL

Waddell Faces Jury on Novel Charge of Helping in Self-Destruction.

A trial unprecedented in the annals of the criminal courts of New York County is that of James Waddell, a conscientious looking young man, who faced a jury and Judge Foster in the Court of General Sessions today to answer to a charge of aiding and abetting his wife, Laura, to commit suicide. The crime was committed June 17 in a flat at No. 334 West Twenty-ninth street.

Waddell and his wife had separated. He looked her up on the date mentioned and they agreed to die together. They lay down on a bed after turning on the gas, but the gas method was too slow and the woman sent Waddell out for a revolver. He bought a pistol in a pawnshop with money realized by parting his watch. Going back to the flat he talked her over with his wife. She agreed to kill him and then to kill herself.

The story of what followed appeared incredible when Waddell first told it, but it has been sufficiently substantiated to establish its truth. Waddell and his wife, each furnished themselves out on the bed, the man on the inside, against the wall. The understanding was that the woman was to shoot him in the head and then fire a bullet into her own brain.

He closed his eyes and waited for the report. He heard it right at his ear, but felt no pain or shock. For a moment he thought that the bullet had passed clear through his brain, numbing his faculties. Then a groan from his wife aroused him. Opening his eyes, he saw her in the death throes. She had killed herself instead of shooting him. Still weak from the effects of the gas and the excitement, Waddell climbed over her body. He took the pistol from her hand and tried to shoot himself, but the trigger would not pull. He could not pull the trigger. Staggering to a window he opened it and called a policeman who was passing.

WOMAN LEAPS INTO RIVER AND CRIES FOR HELP

As the ferry-boat Garden City of the Long Island Railroad line, was nearing the Thirty-fourth street landing, suddenly before noon, a slightly dressed, middle-aged woman walked hastily to the rear of the boat, and, in the presence of more than a hundred passengers, plunged into the water.

The boat was crowded late and all eyes were turned to the woman. A rescue party was quickly organized. A deck hand, and John Walsh, a passenger, started the work of rescue. The woman was quickly pulled out of the water and she began uttering at the top of her voice "save me, save me!" Two lines were hastily thrown to her. She lost no time in grasping the ropes. In a few seconds she was hauled to the deck and instantly the women from the machine piled out to aid in reviving the attempted suicide. A few blankets were provided and part of her was clothing removed. Then the woman spoke.

"My name is Mrs. Frances Blanchard and my husband, Robert M. Carson, is one of the downtown restaurateurs. We had some trouble and I wanted to end it all. When I saw the water I thought I was sorry. I cannot tell you anything more about the matter. How I felt I would not give her address. Her condition is critical."

COP'S ACCUSER IS FORGETFUL AS A WITNESS

Kearney, Called to Sustain Charge of Perjury, Halts on Stand.

The trial of Policeman Leander Terhune, of the West One Hundred and Fifty-second street station, on a charge of perjury before Judge Rosinsky in General Sessions attracted a large crowd today.

Terhune is accused of perjuring himself as a witness in the case of a youth named Smith, who was on trial for burglary last June. The policeman testified he had seen Smith burglarizing a candy store which, it is alleged, he was not within a half-mile of the store.

Policeman Kearney, who first discovered the burglary, was the principal witness today against Terhune. It was difficult for Assistant District Attorney Hart to get a decisive answer from him. Kearney said he had seen a man in the candy store, but was not sure it was Smith. He rapped for assistance, he said, and a number of policemen came. He could not remember whether Terhune was one of the men who responded. He did not see him there, at any rate.

Lawyer Abe Levy, Terhune's counsel in his cross-examination of Kearney got him badly confused. Kearney contradicted himself repeatedly.

LEFT \$5,000,000 TO BUILD A HOME FOR ORPHAN GIRLS

Robert M. Carson, of Philadelphia, Who Died in Theatre, Made Rich Bequest.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 22.—It was announced today that the will of Robert M. Carson, a millionaire, of this city, who died suddenly in a theatre here last week, provides for a \$5,000,000 institution for orphan girls patterned after Girard college in this city, which is exclusively for boys.

The bequest becomes effective after the death of the widow, Mrs. Frances Carson. The institution will be located at Flourtown, just over the city line in Montgomery County.

Like Girard's will, Mr. Carson's bequest provides that the institution shall not be controlled by any religious denomination, and that religious services shall be held in the institution that are peculiar or exclusive to any church.


