

MORGAN, IT IS SAID, GETS PLUM FROM MORSE

Wall Street Hears that Financier Now Controls Consolidated Steamship Company.

Dictates Own Terms.

Requires Transfer of Securities in Return for Assistance in Taking Up a Loan.

It is reported in Wall street that J. Pierpont Morgan has secured control of the Consolidated Steamship Company.

Mr. Morgan, it is said, got the Consolidated Steamship Company in the same way he got Tennessee Coal and Iron for the United States Steel Corporation.

Borrowed \$2,600,000.

The Consolidated Steamship Company previous to the panic had borrowed \$2,600,000 from the Bank of North America.

Charles W. Morse, 33 Wall street reports he went into the market and attempted to realize enough money to square the loan by selling Consolidated Steamship bonds.

There was only one man who could help out in the pinch, and that was J. Pierpont Morgan.

Morgan Got It Cheap.

It is stated that control of the corporation, which started in business with stock representing a par value of \$10,000,000, passed to Mr. Morgan for an actual consideration of less than \$200,000.

\$750,000 DIAMOND A BIRTHDAY GIFT TO KING EDWARD

Transvaal, the Donor, Joins in Notable Celebration of His 66th Anniversary.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—The birthday of King Edward who was born Nov. 9, 1861, was observed to-day throughout the British Empire with the customary military and naval salutes and displays.

The presentation was made by Sir Richard Solomon, ex-Lieutenant-Governor of the Transvaal, representing the people of that colony and in commemoration of the grant of a responsible government to the Transvaal.

GOLD COMING WILL COVER BANK LOSS OF \$51,924,625

Clearing-House Statement Shows Surplus Deficit Heaviest on Record.

While the deficit in the bank surplus has been increased to \$51,924,625, the heaviest on record, as shown by the weekly Clearing-House statement issued to-day.

President Hepburn, of the Chase National Bank, explained that the gold brought here by this week's steamers did not get in in time to show fully in the bank report.

The decrease in the surplus this week was over \$13,000,000, which, added to last week's loss of \$38,000,000, brought the total deficit to date up to \$51,924,625, as stated.

In addition to the cut in reserves there was an increase in loans of \$3,000,000, which was another feature of the report.

The figures as issued at the Clearing-House were as follows: Loans, increase, \$3,000,000; Deposits, increase, \$112,400,000; Disbursements, increase, \$112,400,000; Legal tenders, increase, \$88,000,000; Reserve, decrease, \$13,000,000; Reserve required, increase, \$7,720,000; Deficit, increase, \$1,085,820.

BOY BANDIT IS LOCKED UP ON FATHER'S PLEA

Albert Kriedley, Only Eighteen, Has Terrorized Corona, L. I., for Two Years.

USES KNIVES AND A GUN.

Acquires Habits of a Desperado Through the Reading of Cheap Novels.

Albert Kriedley, a slender, light-haired youth of eighteen years, with a doll face and pleasant appearance, was arraigned in the Long Island Police Court to-day charged with being dangerous and incorrigible by his father, Charles Kriedley, of No. 178 Randall avenue, Corona, Long Island.

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TAFT'S CARRIAGE DRAWN BY BOYS IN BIG SEND-OFF

Army of Cheering Filipinos See Secretary Sail from Manila to Vladivostok.

MANTILA, Nov. 8.—The departure of Secretary of War Taft from this city on the cruiser Rainbow for Vladivostok to-day was attended by a remarkable demonstration on the part of the Filipino revolutionaries.

Mr. Taft started from the residence of Governor-General Smith at 8 o'clock this morning. He reviewed the long array of civic and school parades on the Luneta at 9, making a brief address in which he thanked the people for their reception, praised the course of the Assembly and expressed his confidence in the future of the island.

Mr. Taft and party embarked at 11:30 A. M. and sailed at 11:50, the launch on which they were being escorted down the bay by a flotilla of harbor launches with military and civil officials on board to the Rainbow, where they said their last good-byes.

\$7,000 IN GEMS STOLEN FROM THE ENDICOTT

Masked Men Force Way Into Hotel, Lock Maid in Room.

Closely following the robbery of Mrs. Strong in the Hotel Woodward, Fifty-fifth street and Broadway, when masked robbers, armed with revolvers, climbed down a rope from the roof and entered the apartment and looted them after locking Mrs. Strong and her maid in a rear room, a similar robbery was reported to the police to-day from the Hotel Endicott, Eighty-third street and Columbus avenue.

The Endicott guest who was robbed was Robert A. Crepel, a mining engineer, with large interests in South Africa, who, with his wife, two children and maid, has apartments on the sixth floor of the Endicott. Although the robbery took place on Thursday night and the thieves made off with jewelry valued at between \$3,000 and \$7,000, the case was not made public.
