HILL STOCKS LEAD ADVANCE IN MARKET

List, Under Good Influence, Shakes Off Pressure, and Prices Close Strong.

Stocks showed sharp declines in the early market to-day. Canadian Pacific losing 13.4, American Smelting 11.8 and Northern Pacific, New York Central, United States Steel preferred, Amalgamated Copper and Anaconda large fractions. American Car rose.

The trading was dull. There was a slight rally later, but prices fell again turned the tide and broke selling to the opening level. A sustained demand in the early afternoon for the Hill stocks imparted a much firmer tone to the general railroad list, and there was also indications of support in the Copper stocks.

The total sales of stock to-day were 78,400 shares and of bonds \$4,616,000.

RIDGELEY'S CALL TO BANKS SPECIFIC

Currency Comptroller Wants Full Statement on Clearing-House Certificates.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—The Comptroller of the Currency to-day issued a call for a statement of the condition of National banks at the close of business Dec. 3.

The following is a copy of a telegram which was today forwarded to the managers of all clearing houses by Mr. Ridgeley, the Comptroller of the Currency: "Report of conditions called for Tuesday, Dec. 3. Instruct all clearing-house banks to report clearing-house certificates as follows: On face of report, below item 10, under 'Resources,' or below item 22, under 'Liabilities,' as 'clearing-house accounts of net balance.' On back of report, below item 10, in check of 'Loans and discounts,' show total amount of clearing-house certificates taken out by the reporting bank and the total amount on hand."

The call for a statement of the condition of national banks was not unexpected in financial circles here. Only four of the five calls required by law each year had been made, and in the natural course of events it was anticipated that the fifth and last call would be made tomorrow.

VERE ST. LEGER GOULD AND WIFE GUILTY OF MURDER.

MONTE CARLO, Dec. 4.—Vere St. Leger Gould and his wife, Marie, who have been on trial before the Superior Court of Monaco, charged with the murder of Emma Levin, at Monte Carlo last summer, were to-day found guilty. Mrs. Gould was sentenced to death and her husband to imprisonment for life.

NEW SITE FOR PRISON ON WEST SHORE OF HUDSON.

ALBANY, Dec. 4.—The commission provided for by an act of the last Legislature and appointed by Gov. Hughes to select a site for a new prison to take the place of Sing Sing, announced here to-day that it has closed negotiations for the purchase of about 50 acres on the west shore of the Hudson River, about forty miles from New York City. The land is situated in the towns of Stony Point, Highland County, and Highland, Orange County, between Woodstown Light and Popolopen Creek. The land was purchased from Charles E. Lambert for \$75,000.

SUBWAY FOR BERLIN.

BERLIN, Dec. 4.—Berlin is to have an underground railroad running northward and southeast through the heart of the city from Charlottenburg to Hixdorf. It will cost \$15,000,000.
