

WOMAN ON TRIAL FOR KIDNAPPING HER OWN CHILD

Novel Charge in the Indictment Brought Against Mrs. Maude Clark.

BOY HAD BEEN ADOPTED

Mrs. Clark Was Afterward Prompted by Mother Love to Take Him Away.

The crime of kidnapping her own child is charged against Mrs. Maude Clark, who was placed on trial to-day before Judge Malone in the Court of General Sessions. The case is so unusual that it has attracted a great deal of attention among lawyers, and Assistant District-Attorney Train's attempt to convince a jury that a mother should be punished for taking her only son away from his adopted parents will be closely followed.

Mrs. Clark, a good-looking, energetic, self-possessed young woman, divorced her husband some years ago. She turned her baby boy, Carlton, over to Dr. and Mrs. Kramer, of No. 87 Lexington avenue, for adoption and signed the legal form of release of her claims. By agreement with the Kramers, Mrs. Clark called on her child at intervals. As the boy waxed sturdy and smart the mother yearned to possess him. She tried to make some arrangements to secure control of him, but Dr. and Mrs. Kramer loved him too well to let him go.

On Oct. 14 last Dr. Kramer's sister took Carlton for a walk in Central Park. On the way home they were stopped by Mrs. Clark and a woman named May Bradley, who put the child into a carriage and drove away with him.

Mrs. Clark fled to the home of her parents in Dorchester, Mass., but the Kramers put detectives on her trail and she went on to St. Johns, N. B. From there she returned to Boston with the boy in January and was arrested.

An indictment for kidnapping was found against her. Upon her pledge to appear for trial she was released on parole. She is defended by Lawyer John J. Finn, who will establish that his client had every natural and legal right to take possession of her boy.
