

MRS. JOAN CUNEO MAY WIN CROWN IN AUTO CARNIVAL

To-Day's Big Vote Places Her 14,375 Ahead of Her Nearest Competitor.

ELECTION NEARS CLOSE.

Beginning of Last Week Finds L. K. Clark Leading for King by 2,569 Votes.

Napoleon was no prouder of his marshals or Washington of his generals who helped him fight the long war for liberty than Grand Marshal R. G. Howell, of the Northern car, is of the four good fellows who will marshal the four divisions of the great illuminated night pageant of the Automobile Carnival on Tuesday April 7.

As every thing in that parade will be an automobile, each marshal will ride in his own. Marshal H. Irving Fickling, of the first, or racing, and old models—the historical division—will ride a Stearns car; Marshal Alexander Howell, of the decorative division, a Haynes; Marshal J. H. Manning, of the dealers' division, a Studebaker; and Marshal Howard E. Wagner, of the commercial division, will have one of his own Buick electric.

Grand Marshal Howell has offered, as a special inducement, to give the place of honor in the first division, right behind the throne cars bearing the King and Queen of the carnival, respectively, to any one producing a decade of models, this carnival being to commemorate the close of the first decade of the "motorless carriage" in New York City.

After the "old models" will follow in the same division nearly every prize-winning racing car in the history of automobile racing, including those which carried off the honors in the recent Florida races, and the eighteen racing cars entered for the Briarcliff races on April 24.

Cornelia Vanderbilt's name was inadvertently omitted from the list of new men on the governing board of the Automobile Club of America as published.

Mrs. Cuneco Starts Last Lap in Lead. The last week of the most remarkable election ever held, that for the selection of a King and Queen for the Automobile Carnival, opens with Mrs. Joan Cuneco in the lead for King with 22,021 votes, while Leonard Knight Clark, of the New York Transportation Company, heads the list of candidates for Queen with 45,948 votes.




