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## TONS OF MONEY BET ON BENNINGS SELLING EVENT

### Fourth Race, Won by Nanno at 6 to 1, Proves the Best Race of the Day, Several Other Horses Being Well Played.

**BENNINGS RACE TRACK, WASHINGTON, D. C., April 6.**  
The fourth event, a selling race for fillies and mares, was the belting event of the day here. Almost everything in the race was played, but most of the money went on Tea Leaf, Laughing Eyes, Nanno, Lady Isabel and Javotte. There was almost enough money bet on the five alone to buy the entire Bennings track.  
Nanno, admirably ridden by McCahey, proved the winner in a hot drive which five or six lunched together. Out of the blanket finish the judges made Laura A. a long shot, second, with Javotte third. Lady Isabel and Laughing Eyes were close up. Margery and Javotte made the early pace in that order until well in the stretch. At the eighth pole it looked like anyone's race, but Jockey McCahey proved the best in the drive from there home.  
Tommy Burns and Shaw were on the job again to-day, their terms of suspension having expired. Shaw rode Jubilee in the third race to an easy victory, and Burns was second on Al Busch in the two-year-old event.  
It was announced at the track to-day that Trainer Tom McCreery, who was shot in the leg by a stray bullet from Congressman Hedlin's gun recently when the latter tried to shoot up a negro, is now a victim of lockjaw. His mouth is kept open by a lead pencil. A piece of his clothing which penetrated his leg with the bullet was removed to-day.  
**Bergen's Son on Winner.**  
Marty Bergen's son put over his second winner of the meeting in the opening event, winning easily by three lengths after a good ride on Servile. He came from behind in the stretch with a great burst of speed. It was close between Kempton, Ferry Landing, Al H. Woods and Waterbridge for the place and show honors, and almost all would have been selected for the positions. The judges, however, called Kempton second and Al H. Woods third. Kempton, Waterbridge and Ferry Landing made all the early running right into the stretch. Azure Maid, played heavily by Charlie Heener and his followers, was off in a tangle and never had a chance.  
**Personal Won Second Race.**  
As good as a 1-2 to 1 was laid against Jimmie McLoughlin's good Kinky Mackilly Personal in the second race. She won in a big gallop, with McCahey looking over his shoulder. Personal against Personal was due to her poor race Saturday, when she ran below her form. To-day, after the first furlong, she heated into a three lengths lead which she held easily to the end. Al Busch jumped away in front at the start, but was soon overhauled by both Javotte and Dan De Noxles. The last named tried to hold Personal after that, and the effort cost him very many honors for he flung at the end of front Al Busch by a head in front of the fast coming Balbek. This one will be hard to beat when the distance lengthens out. He is a slow beginner and races green.

### Third Win for Jubilee

Fred Littlefield's Computo colt Jubilee won his third race very handsomely from Pantoufle, who set Giles a head for the place money. Jubilee outdistanced the field and might have won in much faster time but he was forced to drive him to the limit. Jubilee was a 1-2 to 1 favorite, and as he was voted a close liberal and took it for honors. Pantoufle, Goss Past and Giles, Goss Past, however, ran far below her form. Far after leading in the first eighth she dropped out of it to let Pantoufle and Giles fight it out all the way until well in the stretch, when Shaw sent Jubilee to the front easily.

### Vize Money on Winners.

Roldmoore was played as if "in" in the fifth, even though his recent form has not been good. Billy B. Van was well played, while Lally was practically neglected and Umbrella was ridiculed. The wise money triumphed for Roldmoore won on the post after a poor ride by Burns. He ought to have walked home. Billy B. Van, the best horse in the race, losing only in the last stride. Umbrella was third. Lally, instead of laying down, was a long shot, but he followed the stiff early pace and it killed him off.

## MANY IN PLOT TO MURDER CHICAGO POLICE OFFICIAL

Inspector McCann, Active Against Dive-Keepers, Escapes Assassination.  
**THIRTY MEN ARRESTED.**  
Intended Victim Got Warning of Red Light Conspiracy and Was Prepared.

**CHICAGO, April 6.**—Thirty arrests were made to-day following an attempt to assassinate Police Inspector McCann, who has been active of late in suppressing opium dens and disorderly resorts in the red light section of the city. The police are secretive regarding the details of the matter, but it is known that the persons under arrest are charged with being implicated in a conspiracy to do away with the inspector.  
Extraordinary activity about Police Headquarters to-day, and the sight of several prisoners who are well known in the Red Light District were the first intimations to the newspapers that there had been an attempt made to kill a policeman. For some reason information was refused, and for a time it was thought that McCann had been attacked by an anarchist, such as the man who recently attempted to kill Chief of Police Shippy.  
It has been discovered that the conspiracy was hatched by dive-keepers and that certain reckless characters were told to kill McCann. He had been warned, however, by stool pigeons of the attempt that was to be made upon his life and was prepared to meet it. McCann has been under cover to-day. The police authorities refuse to say whether or not he was badly injured. It is thought that he escaped unhurt.  
The conspiracy, it is said, reaches right home to politicians of more or less prominence who are directly or indirectly interested in disorderly resorts, gambling houses and opium dens. Warnings have reached McCann from sources of power that he was "getting too gay."

## MOTHER SAVES BABY AS AUTO RUSHES ON PAIR

Pushes Perambulator From Path of Fire Chief's Motor in Time.

Mrs. R. D. Burchell, of No. 187 Concord street, Brooklyn, by presence of mind this afternoon saved her own life and prevented her two-year-old baby from being crushed by an automobile in front of No. 191 Myrtle avenue. The automobile, running forty miles an hour and operated by Fireman James De Moll, is used by Fire Chief Lally to convey him to and from fires.  
An alarm came in for a fire at No. 191 Columbia Heights. The call was important and De Moll started for his chief's home, at No. 175 Adelphi street. The car was tearing down the street when the front axle broke. One of the wheels rolled off and the auto turned its hood toward the sidewalk.  
Mrs. Burchell was pushing a carriage containing her baby. She saw her danger, gave the perambulator a vigorous shove and retreated. The carriage was overturned and the baby was thrown out, landing on the sidewalk. The auto kept on its course, picked up the empty carriage and shoved it through the butcher shop window of Albert Rosen.  
The baby suffered slight cuts about the face, and Mrs. Burchell, after being congratulated by many who had seen her performance, took her child home.

Took the Actor to Her Apartments in the St. Regis, He Charges, and Once Registered as His Wife.  
**ENUMERATES HER DAILY CONSUMPTION OF LIQUORS.**

Mrs. Gould Declares That Gossip of Stable and Pantry Is Used by Her Husband to Avoid His Obligations in Her Suit for Separation and Alimony.

## What Mrs. Howard Gould Drank In a Day, as Alleged by Husband

Three cocktails before breakfast. One pint of white wine at luncheon. Several brandy highballs during the afternoon. Three cocktails before dinner. Champagne in liberal quantities during dinner. Liqueurs after dinner. Another brandy highball, which she called a "nightcap," at bedtime.

In addition to this she kept bottles of brandy, gin and liqueurs in her boudoir, of which she would partake off and on during the day and night.

Howard Gould's answer to the suit of his wife, Katherine Clemons-Gould, for a separation and alimony, which was filed in the Supreme Court this afternoon, forms the most amazing document that has ever figured in a divorce trial in New York City.

For the first time the name of Dustin Farnum, the actor, is brought forward as a co-respondent. In addition, Mr. Gould declares that his wife was grossly intoxicated at many public places on many occasions, that she consumed daily enough mixed drinks to put several strong men out of business; that at theatres, restaurants and hotels she repeatedly behaved in a scandalous manner while under the influence of cocktails, highballs and champagne; that she once broke up a fashionable card party by biting her hostess in the arm, and that she shocked a wedding party at St. Thomas's Church by announcing that she saw "many old cats" present.

Mr. Gould's lawyers accused Katherine Clemons-Gould, the ex-actress, with having secretly met Farnum in the summer of 1906, with following him through New England, with accompanying him to his rooms in Pennsylvania and various other towns, with touring with him about New York and Brooklyn in her automobile, and with taking him to the Hotel St. Regis, where she then lived.

According to their claim it was the wife's behavior with the good looking star of "The Virginian" that caused Howard Gould to abandon his wife. In addition to the clause involving Farnum the answer filed by the millionaire's counsel embodied all the older allegations which he has previously made against her—misconduct with Col. W. F. Cody (Buffalo Bill), both before and after her marriage, drunkenness, quarrelling and using obscene and profane language.

Registered as Farnum's Wife.

Specific instances are cited of alleged meetings between Farnum and Mrs. Gould. On one occasion at Atlantic City she is charged with having registered at a hotel under an assumed name as his wife.

The first mention of Dustin Farnum's name created a distinct shock of surprise when it came out before Justice Dowling, where the lawyers on both sides were arguing a motion to try the separation suit before a jury. Clarence J. Shearn, an attorney for Mrs. Gould, in asking for a jury, declared that Howard Gould "had gathered together a mass of stable and pantry gossip from grooms, butlers and stable boys in his desperate efforts to escape the rightful obligations of a husband." A few minutes later Archibald Watson, of the Virginia Nicolli's office, who opposed Mr. Shearn's motion, offered Howard Gould's answer.

Common Gossip in the Company.

The fourth paragraph dealt with Farnum. According to its language Mrs. Gould's intimacy with Farnum was a source of common gossip among the members of the company playing "The Virginian," in which the actor was then starring, and in the theatre profession generally. Nevertheless, none of the newspaper stories which marked every stage of the Goulds litigation has the identity of Dustin Farnum been hinted at even remotely.

Dustin Farnum is one of the best known of the younger actors on the American stage. He is a remarkably handsome man. This year he figured as leading man in three failures—first in Augustus Thomas's play, "The Ranker," then in Paul Armstrong's melodramatic comedy, "Society and the Bulldog," and last in "In the Rector's Garden," which was taken off after a short run. His biggest hit he scored in the dramatization of Owen Wister's Western story, "The Virginian," in which he had the title role. He is well known in local club life.
