

Woman Accuses Husband of Mysterious Murder of Millionaire Rosenheimer at Pelham Manor

Mrs. Monaco Declares He Killed Former Employer in Mistake for Delucia, His Rival, With Whom She Afterward Eloped.

MONACO HAD COUPLE ARRESTED IN WEST

His Threats of Vengeance Led Woman to Tell Story—Alleged Slayer Is Captured, and His Spouse and Her Companion Held as Witnesses.

The Westchester authorities are anxiously awaiting word from Chief of Police Ward, of the village of Pelham. He went to Huntington, Ind., several days ago to investigate a report, wired from there, that the murderer of Julius T. Rosenheimer was in custody.

Mr. Rosenheimer, a millionaire novelty manufacturer, was beaten to death in the garden surrounding his mansion at Pelham, at 9 o'clock in the evening of June 18, 1907.

Mrs. Frank Monaco, formerly a resident of Pelham, eloped from there about the time of the Rosenheimer murder, with a man named Delucia. Monaco, it appears, traced them to Huntington, where the woman caused his arrest, by charging him with the Rosenheimer murder. She said that Monaco, learning that she and Delucia were to meet in the garden of the Rosenheimer mansion, went there to kill Delucia.

Picked Out the Wrong Couple. Mr. and Mrs. Rosenheimer appeared in the garden after dinner, and Monaco, mistaking the couple for his wife and Delucia, killed Mr. Rosenheimer. According to Mrs. Monaco, she and Delucia met at another point and eloped that night. They did not hear of the killing of Mr. Rosenheimer for several days. In the meantime Monaco had taken up their trail.

It is recalled in Pelham that a Mrs. Higgen, residing a short distance from the Rosenheimer place, saw two Italians hiding behind a hedge in front of her house the night of the murder. She heard conversing in low tones in Italian, and inferred that they were waiting for some one. This seems to be evidence corroborative of Mrs. Monaco's story.

Following the flight of Mrs. Monaco and Delucia and the pursuit by the husband, an anonymous letter reached the police of Pelham stating that Mr. Rosenheimer had been killed by a jealous Italian, who mistook his rival for another man. There was no clue to the writer of the letter at that time.

Monaco relentlessly followed his wife and her paramour and located them at Huntington about a month ago. He had them arrested, they were convicted and are now serving a sentence in jail. Monaco has been calling on his wife daily since her arrest. The police thought he was endeavoring to win her back to him and allowed the two to talk quietly. A few days ago Mrs.

Rosenheimer for Delucia and Mrs. Rosenheimer for me. He jumped out at Mr. Rosenheimer and beat him to death. He took some money and his watch from him after he had discovered his mistake. "I know the story all the time, and kept still. So did Delucia. We were afraid to talk. We were afraid of Monaco. He is desperate and a bad man. Just before we went to live at Pelham Manor my husband stabbed a man in a card game at Rochester."

Monaco called the jail guards to her and begged: "Keep that man Monaco away from me. He is taunting and threatening me. He swears he will have more vengeance against me than I have."

Monaco was not allowed in the jail until he had taken his stand outside the jail, where he could see his wife through a window, and continued to taunt her and swear vengeance.

Wife Accuses Him. "That man has me frightened," she told the jail officials. "Now I will have my vengeance. My husband is the murderer of Mr. Rosenheimer, for whom he killed in thinking he was Delucia."

"I love Delucia and I hate Monaco, my husband. My husband suspected the truth last spring and began to watch Delucia and me. Delucia wrote me a note to meet him in the garden outside the Rosenheimer home on June 18 last. My husband intercepted the note and went to meet Delucia and kill him. "Mr. and Mrs. Rosenheimer were in the garden. It was dusk and in the half light my husband mistook Mr.

A policeman slipped outside the jail and Monaco was seen in handcuffs charged with the murder. Chief of Police Marks, of Pelham, was notified by the Huntington police of the arrest and the confession of the wife. He hurried to Indiana last week. On the watch stolen from Mr. Rosenheimer were the initials "J. T. R." Efforts to trace this watch were futile. The police then turned their attention to the foreign colonies in the vicinity of the Rosenheimer place. On every hand secrecy was observed. The foreigners who were questioned simply shrugged their shoulders and pleaded ignorance. However, on June 24, a week after the murder, while the colony was in a high state of excitement, Harold Gentle went to the police and told how he had murdered the millionaire. The man's mind had been unbalanced.

by the tragedy, and the constant appearance of detectives, and it was found that he was crazy, that he was in no way concerned in the tragedy. Talked of Inside Job. Failing to fix the crime on any of the foreigners, efforts were made to show that Mr. Rosenheimer was put to death by some workmen whom he discharged from service. This failed utterly, and the police and army of detectives all anxious for the case toward offered for the murderer, began to talk of the murderer having been an "inside job" and hinted that the watch and money were stolen merely to make it appear that robbery had been the motive. No one was more active in trying to solve the mystery than young Edward Rosenheimer. It was shown that at the time of the murder he and "Kid" Brown, a boxing instructor, were in the house exercising and that at Mrs. Rosenheimer's cry they ran to the garden, where they found the millionaire's body and his wife unconscious a short distance away. In their anxiety to get the reward offered by young Rosenheimer the police searched the millionaire and even the son of the murdered millionaire to the severest test of examination and electric dug into the history of both of them and into their habits and the relations that existed between father and son. The report was started that Everett had hoped to buy a road house which he expected Mr. Rosenheimer to finance for him. It was also unjustly charged that young Rosenheimer was given to late hours and that the relations between him and his father were not cordial.
