

WREGLAND ON STAND JUDGES MANY QUESTIONS

"Does Not Recollect" Whether He Succeeded Widener as President.

"SEE RECORDS," HE SAYS

Morehead Also a Witness in Suit Against the Metropolitan.

The taking of testimony in the suit of Emanuel Wolf and Minnie Weder against certain directors of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company was resumed before Justice Young in the Seventh District Municipal Court this morning.

The complainants' counsel, Eugene Kremer and James Wesley Parks, were the first of the local trial to arrive. They were soon followed by John H. Stanchfield, H. H. Vreeland and D. Clifford Morehead, the last named secretary and treasurer of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company and formerly auditor of the New York City Railway Company.

Mr. Morehead was the witness when court adjourned last week, resumed the stand this morning. The first question asked the witness was a repetition of the last question at Friday's session, and upon which there was a discussion at that time.

"Are you a holder of stock in the Metropolitan Street Railway Company?" was the question.

"I was asked as to a certain date if I owned any stock in the Metropolitan Street Railway Company," replied Mr. Morehead. "I testified before the Public Service Commission that I did not. At other times I did. Both answers are correct. At present I am not a stockholder."

"Have you any other occupation at this time?"

"I am transfer agent for the Third Avenue Elevated road."

"Are you receiving compensation for your services as secretary of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company?"

A strenuous objection was interposed by Mr. Stanchfield, of course, for the company, and after an argument the question was ruled out. Later the witness was allowed to state that he had received pay for services as secretary for not as treasurer. This compensation was paid by the Metropolitan Securities Company. Mr. Morehead was then excused temporarily.

Herbert H. Vreeland took the stand, and in answer to a question by Mr. Stanchfield, testified that he was president of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, the New York City Railway Company, and the Metropolitan Securities Company.

"Do you know Peter A. B. Widener?"

"Yes, since 1892."

"Have you had any business relations with Mr. Widener?"

An objection to this question was sustained.

"Did you know that in 1892 Mr. Widener was connected with the Metropolitan Street Railway Company?"

"I do not know."

"Did you know that in 1892 Mr. Widener was president of that company or if Widener was a director in 1892?"

"Do you know when he became president of the Twenty-third street railroad?"

"No, the records will show."

"Soon after you came to New York (1889) you became connected with the Twenty-third street railroad, did you?"

"The records will show. I cannot recall the exact date when you became president of the Central Park, North and East Rivers Railroad Company, did you?"

"Yes."

Witness "Couldn't Say."

"Did you know that Ryan, Elkins and Whitney were connected with some of these companies, the Twenty-third street, Houston, West street and Pennsylvania Ferry Company and the Central Park, North and East Rivers Railway Company?"

"Yes, some of them, but I cannot say all of them."

Asked if W. J. Elkins, W. C. Whitney or Thomas P. Ryan were connected with these companies, the witness replied:

"I think so, but I cannot say exactly."

"Have you any business relations with Mr. Ryan?"

Objections by Mr. Stanchfield were sustained.

organization of the Metropolitan Securities Company?"

"Who were the other parties?"

"Don't Drag Whitney In."

"What is the reason for not mentioning Mr. Whitney's name?"

"There is the reason. Those men reported Mr. Ryan as 'dragging in Mr. Whitney's name last week.' That is the reason those men said."

"What part of the negotiations did you participate in?"

"Objection by Mr. Stanchfield."

"This is a silly unanswerable question. The witness is simply unable to answer it."

Mr. Kremer said that the interruptions of Mr. Stanchfield were uncalled for.

Questions were asked as to the witness's relation with several of the subsidiary companies and he said that to the best of his recollection he was a director and president of them.

Forgets Details of Big Merger.

"Were you present when the Third Avenue Railroad Company was leased to the Metropolitan Street Railway in 1890?"

"Yes."

"I have not a recollection as to details running back seven years."

"Did you know of the merger before it was brought to the attention of the directors of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company?"

"I read it in the papers."

So far as details in the laying out of the money money raised by increasing the capital stock, Mr. Vreeland's memory was very faulty. He could not give the mileage the company owned nor the amount of stock since March, 1892. He could not tell whose information could be obtained except in the books of the company. He had never taken the trouble to look the matter up.

Mr. Vreeland, after a long argument and several questions, testified that this is the first time in his experience as a witness that counsel has asked for information which he could not get from records."

3,500 SEEK JOBS AS STRIKE-BREAKERS

Crowd That Answers "Jim" Farley's "Ad" So Great That Police Were Called.

An advertisement which Strike-Breaker "Jim" Farley put in the morning papers saying he wanted to hire men to go to Chester, Pa., to take the places of striking laborers brought to Farley's offices, at No. 24 West Fifty-fourth street, a crowd which some of the bystanders estimated to contain as many as 3,500. Whether the crowd was that big or not, it was big enough to block the sidewalk, overflow into the roadway for half a block and completely shut off approach to the office, which was their common goal.

The policeman on post realized soon after the work-seekers began to arrive that the job would quickly be beyond his control and he notified the West Forty-seventh street station, Capt. Farrell came with his available strength of twenty-five reserves, but even this force found its hands full trying to keep the swarm of men in some sort of order and hold the street open to traffic.

In order to clear away the congestion, one of Farley's representatives made the announcement that the work of booking men for the Chester trip would be carried on at No. 11 West Thirty-seventh street, where, he said, there was a large room with separate entrances and exits. His statement did what the policemen were unable to do. It cleared the street, for instantly most of the waiting men were off.
