

# RIOTERS SHOOT TWO IN CHESTER TROLLEY STRIKE

Motorman Attacked on Car and Leader of Breakers Mobbed in Street.

MANY OTHERS BEATEN.

Hot Fighting in an Effort to End Tie-Up in Pennsylvania City.

CHESTER, Pa., April 16.—The most serious disturbance which has marked the strike of the motormen and conductors of the Chester Traction Company occurred early today, during which two employees of the company were shot. The company attempted to operate a car and William Borgmann, who acted as motorman, was shot in the foot during an attack on the trolley by a large crowd of strike sympathizers. Earlier in the day William Grieseimer, a claim agent of the company, was shot in the leg while leading a squad of forty men who had been imported to take the place of the strikers to the car barn.

Disorder was spasmodic during the night, but the serious outbreak began with the attack on the imported men shortly before 5 a. m. An attempt to lead the men from the hotel at which they were quartered to the car barn by way of back streets was discovered by the strikers and their sympathizers, and in a hand-to-hand fight the imported workers were routed and driven to shelter in the barn. Grieseimer, who was in charge, was struck by a bullet and he was helped into the barn.

The company at once decided to start out a car, and at 5 o'clock it ran from the barn with Borgmann as motorman and another imported man as conductor. The car had not gone far when it was attacked, men swarming aboard from all sides.

The trolley pole was pulled from the wire, the controller was taken from Borgmann and the crowd began to beat him and the conductor. Bricks, pieces of lead pipe, and other missiles were thrown and every window in the car was broken.

A number of revolver shots were fired and one bullet struck Borgmann in the foot. A strong detachment of police rushed up and after considerable effort succeeded in driving the crowd back. The car was left standing on the tracks and Borgmann and the conductor were hustled into the barn.

The police roped off the streets adjacent to the barn and are now on guard about the building. Mayor Johnson went to the scene and strongly condemned the traction company for attempting to resume service without his permission. The Mayor then called a meeting of the Police Committee of City Councils to consider the situation.

The strike began on Monday afternoon to the refusal of the employees to accept a reduction in wages. The company also operates lines between Philadelphia and Chester, and Chester and Wilmington, Del. Traffic on these roads is also suspended.

President Riggs, of the Chester Traction Company, requested Mayor Johnson to ask that a detail of one hundred State policemen be sent here. Mayor Johnson refused because he said he feared the presence of the State police might cause another outbreak. Thereupon Mr. Riggs telephoned to Gov. Blount at Harrisburg and requested that a regiment of the State National Guard be ordered out. The result of the telephone talk is not known.

Sheriff McClure, of Delaware County, in which Chester is located, started from Atlantic City to Chester this forenoon in response to a telephone request from President Riggs, who in-

formed the sheriff that the situation was beyond the control of the municipal authorities.

Has State Police Ready.

PHILADELPHIA, April 16.—Supt. Groome, of the State police, in discussing the Chester situation today, said: "If they are needed I can mobilize 200 police on short notice, but I cannot send men to Chester until called upon by the local authorities. I have a cable on the telephone by President Riggs of the Traction Company, and was told that the situation is serious, but I can do nothing until Mayor Johnson calls upon me for assistance. I do not think," concluded Mr. Groome, "it will become necessary to call out the National Guard."

# SHOT DAUGHTER IN GIRL'S SCHOOL, THEN HIMSELF

Dr. C. O. Swinney, Formerly of This City, Dead; Victim Dying at Asheville.

Despatches from Asheville, N. C., today tell of a double tragedy there yesterday, when Dr. C. O. Swinney, formerly of New York, shot his daughter and then killed himself.

Dr. Swinney left Marion, N. C., two weeks ago to visit his daughter, Nellie, a pretty sixteen-year-old school girl, who is a student at the Normal and Collegiate Institute. He called upon her at the college late yesterday, and while the two were alone in one of the reception rooms, and Nellie was seated at the piano, playing the doctor fired three shots at her, and she died a few minutes later through his own hand, killing himself instantly.

Miss Swinney was picked up in an unconscious condition and is believed to be mortally injured, two of the shots taking effect in the young girl's brain and on a vital artery. Dr. Swinney, who is considered the prettiest girl in the college, had been receiving attentions from young men, which were objected to by her father. He had remonstrated with her, but to no purpose, and when he resumed his duties today, he returned to the piano and began playing.

At the first shot the girl ran from the room and fell in the hallway. There were 300 young women boarders in the building and consternation prevailed.

# CZAR RETIRES GENERALS WHO FOUGHT DUEL

ST. PETERSBURG, April 16.—The

retirement from the army for "private reasons" of Gen. Fock, Smirnov and Reiss is gazetted today in the Russky Invalid. The three officers receive pensions and are entitled to wear the army uniform.

Fock and Smirnov were the principals in the recent sensational duel, fought in one of the regimental riding arenas, and which was witnessed by women of rank and many Russian nobles. The duel was the result of the official report made by Smirnov on the fall of Port Arthur. In it he scored Fock, Commander Stoessel and others, and the

court-martial held not long ago was based on the statements in the report. Stoessel, Fock, Smirnov and Reiss were the principals in the military trial. Stoessel was found guilty and is now serving ten years in a fortress. Smirnov, who was placed on trial for having failed to remove Fock from his command at Port Arthur, was acquitted. Fock and Reiss were tried for complicity in the surrender; the former was reprimanded for a disciplinary offense and the latter was acquitted.

Gen. Smirnov, who was shot and badly wounded in the duel by Fock, is recovering.

# EXILE IN ARIZONA OF COL. STUWART WILL SOON END

WASHINGTON, April 16.—The friends

of Col. William F. Stewart, of the Coast Artillery, who on Oct. 3 last was ordered to the solitude of abandoned Fort Grant, Ariz., have so far succeeded in their campaign for his relief that application is made in authoritative quarters that Col. Stewart will be permitted to choose as a place of residence some one of the Atlantic coast artillery posts. It is predicted the Colonel will not be restored to command.

The case of this officer is regarded as one of the most peculiar in the annals of the War Department. The correspondence which is available shows that an official communication from the

War Department was addressed to him at his post, Fort Buchanan, Fla., last September, which reads: "Pursuant to instructions from the President, the department is prepared to issue an order assigning you to station at Fort Grant, Ariz., without command. The President has directed, however, that before the order is issued an opportunity be given you to apply for immediate retirement." Col. Stewart's reply was: "If appointed brigadier-general will retire. If not, will remain on duty." He at the same time requested two months' leave of absence to arrange his personal affairs and settle his family in case his assignment to Fort Grant should be ordered. He was refused this request.
