

CONEY FLOODED WITH MILLIONS OF FAKE INSURANCE

Everybody Rushed to Get Reasonable Rate Made by M. J. Northbrooke.

Marcus J. Northbrooke, who claims to be a fire insurance agent with offices at No. 2 Hudson street, was arrested this afternoon on a warrant issued in the Coney Island Police Court, which charges him with grand larceny in having fraudulently issued policies and collected money as the representative of the Metropolitan Fire Insurance Company of Chicago.

According to Coney Islanders who believe they have been victimized by Northbrooke, he first appeared at the seashore resort a few weeks after the disastrous fire which visited the Island last summer. He introduced himself to "Fatty" Langtry, a former Bowery character and prize-fighter, who now conducts a real estate and insurance business on Surf avenue, Coney Island.

Northbrooke early this year started operations, and issued policies at a 3 and 4 per cent. rate, whereas the standard fixed rate is 5 per cent. sent changes in fixed rates in the crowded sections of Coney Island.

Morgan slipped his \$1,000 policy down on Northbrooke's desk and said: "Hand me my \$30 and don't ask questions. I don't want to go to jail."

Northbrooke smiled and wrote out a \$30 check payable to the Acting Night Inspector, Warren and Greenwood streets.

Among others who bought Northbrooke's policies were the following: The music hall proprietor, Joe White, of the Rosebud Hotel; Charles Heppner, owner of the Metropolitan Hotel; Tom Gallagher, who owns Keny Sutherland's old hotel, the Kent; Pat Lennon, Louis Berger, one of the Pat Lennon's right hand men, a hotel keeper; Roxola Virelli, owner of the Santa Lucia Hotel; and others too numerous to mention.

ELECTION CLERKS WITNESSES AT RECOUNT TRIAL

They Testify as to Care of the Ballots in Kings and Queens Boroughs.

George F. England, a clerk in the Brooklyn Bureau of the Board of Elections, was the first witness sworn at the Recount trial this morning.

He was examined by Mr. Dolson as to the care and removal from one place to another of the Brooklyn ballot boxes subsequent to the election of 1906. When the boxes were removed to the Eagle Storage Warehouses, he said, he had been present with Mr. Sandhusen, and had found some seals loose at the ends.

"Were any losses in such a way as to permit of anything being put into the boxes?" asked Mr. Dolson. "No." "Were any of the boxes broken apart?" "No. Two boxes with glass fronts had the glass cracked, but the pieces were not separated."

The witness outlined the precautions taken by the police to prevent interference with the ballots. "Were any of the unused ballots there?" asked Mr. Richards in beginning his examination—were some of them missing?

"I think some of them were missing." "Were some boxes of stubs missing?" "I believe so."

The cross-examination of the preceding witness yesterday afternoon was recalled by Mr. Richards, bringing out for a second time the fact that a certain number of boxes of stubs were not returned. Mr. Dolson, in his recent examination from yesterday, brought out the fact that the law required that such stubs should be removed from the boxes and that this was done in a majority of cases.

Patrolman George W. Goodale, detailed to the Brooklyn Bureau of the Board of Elections in 1906, corroborated much of England's testimony. Testified as to the delivery of boxes and stubs to the police in Queens Borough, but did not give any sensational evidence.

PENSIONS BILL NOW CARRIES \$163,053,000.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—The pension appropriation bill was reported to the Senate today. It carries \$163,053,000, an increase of \$12,184,000 over the amount appropriated by the House. Of this amount \$12,000,000 is provided to carry out the provisions of the recently enacted widows' pension law, while most of the remainder is made necessary for branch pension agencies which were not appropriated for by the House.


