

## WOMAN VICTIM OF DRUGS TRIES SUICIDE BY GAS

Friends With Whom She Sought Shelter Had Taken Morphine From Her.

Hannah Finch, a young woman whose love for morphine is said to have come between her and her mother and sisters, highly respected persons of Brooklyn, was taken from the home of William Wyler and his wife, No. 13 Leroy street, to-day, charged with attempting to kill herself with gas.

Wyler told the police of the Charles street station that when Miss Finch's home was closed to her she had come to his wife, who had known her in the old days.

"Can't I stop here until I can find a home?" she asked of Mrs. Wyler. Mrs. Wyler gave her friend a room, and was kind to her, but yesterday the desire for morphine came over Miss Finch. None was given her, but in some way the young woman secured \$5, and the entire amount was spent for the drug.

Wyler heard of the morphine purchase and took the drug from Miss Finch last night. Then she attempted to kill herself with gas, but Wyler was watching her, and no harm was done. All through the night Miss Finch screamed and begged for morphine. There was no sleep in the Wyler home, and this morning Wyler reported the case to the police. Miss Finch was taken to the Charles street police station and then to Bellevue.

## TEAM KILLS ROLLER SKATER

Boy Racing with Comrades Run Down in Brooklyn Street.

While racing on roller skates with three companions in Fourth avenue, Brooklyn, last night, Warren Vansky, twelve years old, who lived at No. 167 Twentieth street, was run over by a team and fatally injured.

The race was from Twentieth to Twenty-fifth street and the prize was to be cashed purchased by the loser. At Twenty-fourth street Vansky was leading by fifty feet. The team which ran over him was drawing a dirt wagon belonging to August Linke and had become unmanageable in Twenty-fourth street. Boy and team came together at the corner and the wheels of the wagon passed over the boy's body. He died in the ambulance on the way to the Norwegian Hospital.

## CAR CRASH ENDS AUTO RIDE AND INJURES GIRL

Miss Rose Crelling Thrown Out on Head; Rich Mr. Darrow Is Unharmed.

Much mystery for a time was thrown about the identity of a handsome young woman driven to New York in charge of a nurse early to-day after she had been injured in an automobile accident in Downing street, Brooklyn, and after the police of the Classon avenue station had made every effort to suppress the facts.

Rufus Darrow, a wealthy dealer in mason's materials, with yards at the foot of Forty-seventh street and North River, and living at No. 208 West Ninety-third street, and the young lady, said to be Miss Rose Crelling, twenty-two years old, of No. 63 West One Hundred and Fifteenth street, were in the runabout, going north through Downing street, when at Putnam avenue trolley car No. 406 hit it, jammed it ahead for a quarter of a block and hurled it against a trolley pole.

At the first impact Mr. Darrow's charming companion was thrown from the runabout and cut her head severely on the cobblestones. Darrow was badly bruised but in his excitement and earnest desire to help the young lady, he did not mind. She was carried in a boarding-house, No. 49 Putnam avenue, and ambulance surgeon Pierce of the Chamber street Hospital, attended her. She would not go to the hospital.

Patrolman Leonard J. Preston, on whose post the accident occurred, seemed anxious to keep the facts from the newspapers, and instead of making an immediate report to his station, remained a long time in a garage at Classon and Putnam avenues. He did not report the name of the motorman whose

car hit the runabout, but finally reported that the young lady was Miss Crelling.

After she had refused to go to the hospital Mr. Darrow got a nurse, and with the fair patient drove to New York.


