

TAMMANY MEN DRAGGED DOWN McINTYRE FIRM

Brokers Had Carried Accounts
for Politicians Who Lost
Heavily on Inter-Met.

Tammany politicians who suffered great losses in Wall street speculation, as well as other politicians, were reported to-day to have contributed largely to the failure last Friday of the New York Stock Exchange house of T. A. McIntyre & Co. The firm is said to have carried these losses through the sensational decline in Inter-Met. a year ago, and only let go during the great crash of all stocks last October.

"I am now looking up this phase of the failure," said Receiver Charles C. Burlington to-day. "Of course, I do not expect to find accounts in the names of politicians, but there may be clues in the names of their agents, and where it is found that any individual owes the firm I propose to press the claim, no matter who is hit by the disclosure."

Walter Moler, the firm's cotton department manager, who alone has represented the members of the firm in statements to the newspapers, said: "Altogether there stands on the firm's books over \$100,000 due from customers carried through the early stages of the October panic. This is the real situation behind the suspension."

Trusted by Bosses.
Thomas A. McIntyre for years has been the trusted broker of successive political bosses. His trade mark was his ability to conceal the identity of a customer, when a customer so desired.

Leader Charles F. Murphy, of Tammany Hall, although he once gave his occupation as a speculator, has never been found to be set forth on the books of any commission house. Mr. Murphy is not the only political leader said to have been led into the Inter-Met morass by the tip given out in the Fourteenth street wigwag by Andrew J. Freshman.

"Big Tim" Sullivan and "Little Tim" Sullivan were both long on Inter-Met, when Thomas P. Ryan and Frederick H. Sullivan, for Europe the day before "somebody pulled the plug." A prominent financier is known to have carried the Sullivan through all the downward course of Inter-Met, but there are others who were not so fortunate, and it is said that McIntyre "held the bag" for a half dozen such accounts until he had exhausted his own credit. Huge balances due his firm are said to be on the books—an extremely doubtful asset.

Surprise for Receiver.
A surprising discovery of Receiver Burlington to-day was contained in the deed of assignment which was filed April 23 with the County Clerk. The document is typewritten, and all seven partners of the firm are written at its head. Later, it appears, an ink line was drawn through the names of James M. Hudson and James E. Hulsizer. The assignment is signed by George C. Ryan, Edward T. White and John G. McIntyre, the latter a brother of the head of the firm. T. A. McIntyre and his son of the same name did not sign the paper.

In view of the newly advanced claim of Arthur L. Peck, who as co-receiver succeeded himself as assignee of the firm, that there were two firms in the house of T. A. McIntyre & Co., one of seven partners and the other of five. This deed of assignment is a very interesting document. Receiver Burlington is seeking to oust Receiver Peck on the ground that he is too friendly to certain members of the firm.

Threatens Prosecution.
A creditor, who called at the firm's office, No. 71 Broadway, said that he was going to bring a criminal prosecution.

His attorneys are Moore, Blocker & Wheeler, and it would have interested them to place the facts before the District Attorney, he said. "But I have not much confidence in Mr. Jerome since the disclosures of the Special Grand Jury evidence. I am an insurance broker. Early this month

in Washington.

One hundred and fifty pretty girls from Boston and other down East towns landed in New York to-day from the Fall River liner Frisclila, but such tales had they been told of New York that they just took a peek at the sky line and craned their necks at the Singer building, and then hurried on to Washington, where they are to attend the Convention of Working Girls' Clubs which begins to-day and will continue until the fifth of May.

Ordered to Appear.
Thomas A. McIntyre has been ordered to appear before United States Commissioner Gleason and submit to an examination by Irving L. Ernie, counsel for Receiver Burlington.

It is by no means certain that Mr. McIntyre's physical condition will permit his appearance in court. On his return to New York from North Carolina last night, Mr. McIntyre did not go to his apartments in the Wyoming, fifty-fifth street and Seventh avenue. And the report is that he has been taken to a private sanitarium.

The prime purpose of the investigation of Mr. McIntyre is to discover if possible the whereabouts of a large amount of securities which were left in the custody of the firm and which their owners claim had no right to be sold or used for collateral on loans by McIntyre & his partners.
