

BURGLARS LOOT THREE CHURCHES IN THE BRONX

Get Valuables and Communion Wine in Two and Nothing in a Synagogue.

ALSO MAKE LAY VISITS. Spend a Busy Sunday Night Cleaning Out Fruit Store and Tailor's Shop.

Possibly because it was Sunday night, the burglars who for a month past have been causing widespread insomnia in a populous part of the Bronx included three places of worship in their latest itinerary. According to the reports thus far received at the Morrisania Police station the visible results in one immediate section are as follows:

First—Broke into Grace Baptist Church at One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street and Macy place some time after services on Sunday night by way of a side window. Stole the "birthday collection" amounting to about \$20, carried away a lot of Pastor Arthur T. Brooks's private belongings; drank all the communion wine that had been stored in a closet behind the pulpit; kindled a fire of oil-soaked rags and waste paper in the minister's study; went away.

The fire burned itself out after scorching the woodwork and doing damage of about \$150.

Second—Smashed in a door in the Prospect Avenue M. E. Church, two blocks away; ransacked the study; drank some more communion wine; stole from a drawer in the study three rings valued at \$5 and belonging to the little daughters of the clergyman, the Rev. William M. Carr; went away.

Third—Made a vain but earnest effort to cut away the leaden casing of a

\$400 memorial window in the synagogue of the Montefiore Congregation, at Macy and Hewitt places; broke a \$50 window at the side; searched the interior, but got nothing except some small articles belonging to the rabbi, the Rev. Alexander Vesel; went away.

Lay Visits—Carried away most of the bananas and oranges from Paul Bacigallo's fruit store, at No. 118 Union avenue; entered the apartment house above the fruit store, but departed when a tenant awoke and came out to investigate; jimmied in the front window of Nathan Caskin's tailor shop at No. 840 East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street; got two suits of clothes, and in a spirit of innocent merriment broke all the dishes and pans in a small kitchen back of the tailor shop, where Caskin and his wife cook their lunches.

BOY SLASHED WITH RAZOR BY A NEGRO

Kanud Bughardt Attacked by a Stranger While on Way to School.

Kanud Bughardt, thirteen years old, and his brother Charles, who live at No. 41 East One Hundred and Thirty-third street, started to-day for Public School No. 83, at Lenox avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets. As they reached Fifth avenue, at One Hundred and Thirty-third street, a negro boy about Kanud's age slipped up behind him and slashed the lad's back with a razor.

Kanud screamed and fell. The negro ran. Charles lifted his brother and found that the blade had cut through his clothing and left a wound from the base of his neck to the base of his spine. The boy was taken to the Harlem Hospital, where Dr. Moecken said it was nothing more serious than a flesh wound.

When the matter was reported at the East One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street station, Lieut. Walsh sent two plain clothes men out with Charles, who says he can identify the negro. There has been a great deal of trouble with the blacks in this neighborhood. Neither of the Bughardt boys ever saw the negro before. They say they have had no trouble with negroes and believe Kanud's assailant must have taken him for some one else.

GAVE ROBBERS KNOCKOUT WITH HIS CLARINET

Members of the Hold-up Men's Union will please take warning from the case of three young Dick Turpins who tried to rob a German clarinet player early to-day at Grand and Berry streets, Williamsburg.

John Geisering, of No. 114 Grand street, Williamsburg, is the clarinet player. He was on his way home after spending all night at a dance in Manhattan. Bernard Seprinsky, a violin player, accompanied him.

"Throw up your hands!" ordered one of three young hussies as the worn-out musician reached Berry street. "We want your money. Be quick or we will break your blocks off."

Geisering swung his clarinet at the spokesman with true aim and the robber went down for the full count of ten prize ring seconds. Barney, the fiddler, played his No. 9 solo to deliver a solar plexus to the second of the hold-up trio, and the remaining one was hit so

hard that he landed in the middle of the street.

Then Geisering took the clarinet out of the box and blew lustily a high B flat, a few high Cs, and then almost every old kind of a note.

The alarm was heard by Policemen Green and Green a block away, and they came on the run to the assistance of John, the Clarinet Player, and Barney the Fiddler. The assailants were caught, and before they were arraigned in court a hospital surgeon dressed their wounds. Geisering's instrument had left its marks.

The trio said they were John De Witt, of No. 17 North Seventh street, William Gray, of No. 22 Wythe avenue, and Henry Stecht, No. 15 North Seventh street, Williamsburg. They are each twenty-one years old.

In the Lee Avenue Police Court they were held for further examination. Geisering's clarinet has laid up a factory for repairs.

POPE RECEIVES THE BROOKLYN PILGRIMS

Private Audience for Church People Presented by Bishop McDonnell.

ROME, May 25.—Pope Pius X. to-day received in private audience eight Rev. Charles E. McDonnell, Bishop of Brook-

lyn, who subsequently presented to the Pontiff his secretary, Mgr. John I. Barrett, and over one hundred American pilgrims, most of whom left New York with the Bishop April 30.

Bishop McDonnell said he came personally to Rome to express to His Holiness the feeling of affection and loyalty of his diocese on the occasion of the Pope's jubilee, and presented a substantial offering of Peter's pence. The Pope warmly thanked Bishop McDonnell and bestowed on the pilgrims his apostolic benediction.

Rev. James McElroy, of Our Lady of the Rosary, of Brooklyn, was presented to the Pope by Bishop McDonnell. Father McElroy celebrated his own jubilee in the priesthood this year, and he was warmly congratulated by the Pope.

The Pope expressed his gratitude that his American visitors had come so far to see him.

Bishop McDonnell had added to his

party the students now in Rome from the Brooklyn diocese; there are eleven at the American College, four at the Capranica College and two at the College of the Propaganda. Subsequently the entire party was received by Mgr. Merry del Val, the Papal Secretary of State, and later they were photographed in a group in the courtyard of San Damaso.


