FAMILIES IN PANIC AT UPTOWN FIRE IN A TENEMENT

Firemen Rescue Many by Ladders—All Thought to Have Escaped.

Fire started this afternoon in the basement of a crowded tenement at No. 73 West One Hundred and First street and swept through the building on winged heels. Women and children tumbled down the stairways and into the street and many were forced to retreat to the roof and seek refuge in adjoining buildings.

When the firemen arrived they found frantic mothers and terror-stricken children clinging to the fire escapes of the upper floors. Truck No. 23 raised an extension ladder and the firemen carried a score of women and children to the street.

Deputy Chief Lawler said he was sure all had escaped, but that some were silent rumor that some were caught and killed in the building. The fire swept through the structure and destroyed the effects of sixteen families. The house adjoining also suffered.

When the ambulance arrived, Mrs. Schwelke, nursing his injured nose, insisted that he be taken away for treatment. Dr. Foote took him to Roosevelt Hospital, where his nose was restored to Anderson was unhurt.

SHOT AT MAN IN STREET FULL OF LITTLE CHILDREN. Five Bullets Fired, and Lively Battle in a Tenement House Follows.

Mike Conroy, a Traffic Squad cop, was standing at Fourteenth street and Avenue A this afternoon when he heard a pistol shot. Half a block away one young fellow was shooting deliberately at another, who went dodging and zig-zagging back and forth among the frightened children of the Church of the Immaculate Conception, who were just coming out of their parochial school.

Before the policeman could get there the man with the revolver had fired four times. The lead zipped by the heads of the scattering school children, but none of them was hit. The human target jumped down an alleyway and disappeared. Apparently he had not been hit.

Conroy chased the revolver artist up the stairs to the top floor of the tenement-house at No. 54 East Fourteenth street. He overtook him under the scullie leading to the roof and licked him into submission after a brisk fight. In his flight the prisoner had managed to get rid of his pistol.

When the two of them got down to the foot of the steps the captive's brother and five of his friends were waiting. They tried to get the young chap away from Conroy, but the latter backed up into a corner and held them off with his drawn revolver until reinforcements came.
