

HUNGRY PUPILS TO GET LUNCHES WITHOUT COST

First of Free Kitchens Will Be Opened on East Side To-Morrow. TICKETS BEAR PRICE. Reluctance to Accept Charity Overcome by Committee of Relief.

The first of the relief kitchens found necessary by the half-starved condition of hundreds of public school pupils on the east side will be opened at noon to-morrow, at the southwest corner of Canal and Forsyth streets. Another will be opened in a few days at No. 136 Grand street.

At a meeting in the University Settlement Building to-day persons interested in the movement to relieve the distress of the east-side school children reported that there had been some trouble about the charity part of the project. It was feared that if the movement was advertised and conducted solely as a charitable enterprise many of those most in need of the benefit would refrain from taking advantage of it because of false pride or shame.

To meet this condition the name of the project was changed from East Side Children's Relief Committee to the Children's Lunch Counter. Every effort will be made in the future to remove from the enterprise all open appearances of charity.

Price Named on Tickets. Teachers in all the public schools on the east side below Houston street were given tickets to-day for distribution to pupils calling for a meal at the kitchen at Canal and Forsyth streets. The tickets were on sale at five cents each to those children who could afford to buy them and were plainly marked "Price five cents." But the teachers secretly handed the tickets to children most in need of them, and at the kitchen no one will know who paid or did not pay.

Isidor M. Levey Mrs. Sidonia Feltenstein and Philip Sachs constitute the committee which has active charge of the Canal Street Kitchen. Mr. Sachs is a practical baker and lunchroom man. The menu for to-morrow's luncheon for children will include sterilized milk, cereal, an egg and fresh fruits. An effort will be made to provide a wide variety of food at the minimum of cost.

The kitchens are to be kept open all through the summer, after the schools close, and as long as may prove necessary in the fall. It is hoped that before the beginning of the next school session the Board of Education will have established lunchrooms in some of the East Side school houses, where children who are insufficiently nourished at home may be fed.

In addition to the kitchen, relief work in the homes will be continued. A committee of three women was appointed to-day to visit the homes of the parents of children reported by school teachers as apparently suffering for lack of food.

The fund from outside contributions has grown to \$2,000. Among those who sent checks to-day were A. V. H. Stuyvesant, \$100; Julius Heyman, \$50; Cornelia Long White, \$50; and E. T. Stafford, \$25.

THREE GO TO SING SING.

"Rubber-Tired" Johnson and Paul Robbed a Woman.

Luther Harris, George Brooks and Lawrence Johnson, the latter the legless crook who has long been known to the police as "Rubber-Tired" Johnson, were sentenced to six years and three months at Sing Sing by Justice Mulqueen in General Sessions to-day upon a conviction of robbing a woman in a West Twenty-ninth street saloon. At the time of the robbery the police had an easier time capturing the police men who are equipped with legs than they did to get "Rubber-Tired" Johnson. He propels himself about in his little two-wheeled gig, in which he outran the detectives for half a mile.

DICE-THROWING CHARGE AGAINST JEROME IN FORM

That and Other Counts Made in Specific Shape in New Presentment.

(Special to The Evening World.) ALBANY, June 8.—Additional charges against District-Attorney Jerome, of New York, have been filed with Gov. Hughes by William F. King, chairman of the committee representing the minority stockholders of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company. The charges are based on the testimony given before Richard L. Hand, special commissioner appointed by the Governor to hear the original accusations.

District-Attorney Jerome will be given until June 15 to file his answer, and the new counts will be referred to Commissioner Hand.

The charges are supplemental and are made because Commissioner Hand ruled that he could not entertain testimony bearing on the points, as no specific charges had been made against Mr. Jerome in the original papers.

The counts embody three separate specifications: First, that District-Attorney Jerome suggested to E. R. Thomas, against whom an investigation as to criminal transactions were pending before the Grand Jury, that he substitute Justice Davy as his counsel in the case of Edward Leuchowicz, second, that Jerome violated the liquor law by shaking dice for a stake and the drinks with Alton Ryan and his brother and Assistant District-Attorney Garvan, third, that District-Attorney Jerome was unjustly dishonorable and discreditable to the administration of the law.

In that on or about April 1 he arranged with William Montgomery, connected with the Hamilton Bank of New York, against whom two indictments were pending to trap Nathan Weaver in the crime of accepting money for the purpose of influencing the Attorney-General of the State of New York and the papers in New York not to be taken to Montgomery in said criminal matters.

FIGHT FOR GUN BREAKS UP TRIAL IN COURT-ROOM

Brother-of Murdered Man Says He Carried Pistol Because of Threats.

When the trial of Anato Grenaldi, on a charge of murdering Giuseppe Nezzio, in 1906, was called in the Supreme Court, Brooklyn, to-day, Detective Bagnarelli noticed a suspicious bulge in the hip of Vincenzo Nezzio, a brother of the slain Nezzio that it would be wise for him to the outlines of a huge revolver.

Bagnarelli put his hand on the pistol and tried to remove it, whispering to Nezzio was held in the Adams street quietly submit. But Nezzio resisted and wrestled free from the detective's grasp. The court proceedings were interrupted and excited spectators began to climb seats. Justice Aspinall rapped vainly for order.

The detective closed with Nezzio again and, with the assistance of court officers, managed to take the pistol. It was of 44 calibre and fully loaded. The excitement had become so great that Justice Aspinall adjourned court.

After the court room had been cleared, Nezzio was arraigned before the justice. He said his life had been threatened and he carried the pistol to protect himself.

When he came to testify against my brother's murderer," he said, "Grenaldi's friends said they would kill me if I did not stay away."

On the application of the prisoner's counsel, who said the incident would prejudice the jury, the court was dismissed and the case set over until the fall term.

Nezzio was held in the Adams street court for carrying a concealed weapon.
