

DAY, DEFENDER OF OIL TRUST, TO QUIT SYRACUSE?

This is Rumor Following Offer and Refusal of an 8 Months' Vacation.

DISSENSION IN BOARD.

Summary Dismissal of Dean Kent Stirs Up New Enemies for Chancellor.

The early retirement of the Rev. James R. Day, Chancellor of Syracuse University, by resignation or otherwise, is predicted to-day as a result of dissension among the trustees of the university, which has spread to the student body through the summary dismissal of Dr. William Kent, formerly Dean of the College of Applied Science.

The belief is based mainly on the action of the Board of Trustees, announcement of which was made at the annual commencement exercises to-day, in authorizing Chancellor Day to take a vacation for eight months, or for such period as he may see fit. Chancellor Day, although his health is not good, said he could not spare the time to take the vacation, which may precipitate matters.

The explanation that leaves of absence was granted in order that the Chancellor make a trip around the world does not hold in view of his declination to accept it.

Consequently, certain Syracuse alumni residing in New York could see nothing in the action of the trustees, which was taken at the annual meeting last Thursday, except the ultimate resignation of Chancellor Day as administrative head of the institution. A close friend of the Chancellor declared he would not be surprised to hear of his resignation at any time.

Dr. Day has attracted much attention by public criticism of President Roosevelt and his policies, and his defense of the trusts, particularly of the Standard Oil and of John D. Rockefeller.

Dr. Day is understood to have been defended in the Board of Trustees in the Kent affair by John D. Archbold, business associate of Rockefeller, and president of the board, John B. Huyler, of New York, and other wealthy and influential men, and threats were made to withdraw financial support from certain quarters in case of the Chancellor's dismissal. The leave of absence granted carries a pledge to pay all expenses incurred by Dr. Day and his family.

According to a Syracuse trustee, dissension over Dr. Day's course is rapidly leading to conditions which menace the welfare of the university. Two causes are assigned—first, the view of some that Dr. Day's attack on the President yielded only personal notoriety to their author, and, secondly, that the Chancellor's action in the case of Dr. Kent has been inimical to university discipline and spirit.

While refusing to discuss a report that he had received a letter from Dr. Day, and that the latter had tendered his resignation, George Lawrence, until recently a close associate and neighbor of Dr. Day, said:

"I would not be at all surprised if Dr. Day is contemplating resignation. His health is bad and he recently built a large home at Lake Placid, where I know he would like to enjoy a long rest."


An association of the alumni is to contribute an additional \$100,000 to the fund.
