

BOYS DARE FIRE TO SAVE BABIES IN TENEMENT

Heroes of Twelve and Seventeen Years Rescue Two in Burning Room.

PUT OUT BLAZE, TOO.

Puny Louis Fishman and Joe Joyce Keep Their Heads During Panic.

Louis Fishman, twelve years old, puny but courageous, and Joe Joyce, seventeen years old, sturdy and also courageous, did the work of the Fire Department today in saving two children from suffocation and extinguishing a fire which had driven twenty-two families in a six-story tenement into a panic.

The children rescued are the sons of Mrs. Philip Martin, of No. 21 Mangin street. Mrs. Martin left her apartment on the second floor, with her two-year old son Peter, to go marketing. In some way Willie, eight years old, and Jimmie, six years old, ignited the bed clothes in their room and then screamed for help.

Both Dashed Back Into Flames.

Joe Joyce, the head of a crowd of older boys around the corner, seeing the smoke, was at young Fishman's side in a flash. Picking up the exhausted Fishman the boy carried him to the street. Here he was the center of a terrified tenement, who had rushed pell-mell down the staircases when the screams first sounded.

When the firemen came they found the blaze extinguished and families returning to their rooms.

SAFE BLOWERS IN TENDERLOIN MAKE \$600 HAUL

Carry Safe in Child's Restaurant to Cellar and Rip Out Bottom.

So anxious are detectives from Headquarters to keep crimes committed in certain sections of the city that the police of the West Thirtieth street station only learned through a reporter for The Evening World today that safe-blowers had entered Child's restaurant, on the first floor of Child's Building, at No. 108 and No. 110 West Thirtieth street, some time yesterday and robbed the safe of \$600 in cash.

The restaurant is only a short distance from Broadway and at the time of the robbery, when the streets were thronged with people, as they always are on Saturday night and Sunday morning, the precinct men were scouring Broadway in search of excise violations.

Safe Found in Cellar.

Pasquale Jaeline, janitor in the restaurant, began cleaning out yesterday morning at 3 o'clock. If he noticed anything wrong he failed to report it, but later the engineer came to renew pipes and found the safe in the east room. The bottom of the safe had been gouged out, and not so much as a cent of the \$600 was left.
