

ANTI-GAMBLING CRUSADER MADE ILL BY CAMPAIGN

Rev. Dr. Laidlow in Catskills, But Saratoga Sheriff Must Face Governor.

The Rev. Dr. Walter Laidlow, chairman of the Anti-Race Track Gambling Committee, is in the Catskills, recovering from a physical breakdown as a result of the campaign he waged against the gamblers. Against the advice of his physicians he went to Saratoga and accumulated the evidence filed yesterday with Gov. Hughes against Sheriff William Bradley, Jr., of Saratoga County. Dr. Laidlow asks for Sheriff Bradley's removal on the ground that he was willfully permitted gambling at the Spa and neglected his duty.

At the office of the Federation of Churches, No. 119 East Nineteenth street, today it was said that Dr. Laidlow would remain in the Catskills for several weeks. He is camping. In the hope of recovering, said his assistant. "Since the first of the year he has had two operations for appendicitis. The wound from the second operation was not yet healed when he fixed up a belt contrivance and went to Saratoga to investigate."

Told Sheriff of Charges. "Did he see the sheriff at Saratoga?" was asked. "Yes, and when he returned he wrote the Sheriff a letter, warning him that charges would be made to the Governor."

"Will any action be taken against the Kings County authorities?" "No. Mr. Elder and the Sheriff of Kings County are doing all they can," Sheriff Bradley, of Saratoga, declared today he was prepared to go before the Governor next Monday. He was not surprised when the papers were served on him by Gov. Hughes's stenographer.

SHERIFF NOT TO BE MADE A MARTYR OF HUGHES' ZEAL

SARATOGA, N. Y., Aug. 11.—Sheriff John Bradley, Jr., against whom charges of neglect of duty in connection with illegal gambling on the Saratoga race track have been filed, had a conference today with ex-State Senator Edgar T. Brackett, whom he has retained as his counsel.

After the conference Senator Brackett gave out the following statement: "I have seen a copy of the charges against the Saratoga County Sheriff, as published in the morning papers. I know nothing of the facts, nothing that has occurred on the track, because I have not been there. But if the Sheriff has honestly done his duty, on the lines laid down in the written opinion I gave him, for his guidance, he cannot properly be removed, nor have I any idea that he will be, for the opinion simply states the law as it is and as the courts have held it to be."

"I do not believe, nor have I any reason to believe, that the Governor will try to make a martyr of the Sheriff, in order to show his own zeal against race track gambling. In the first place, I do not think that is either the conception or measure of duty of the Governor. In the next place, such a course is entirely unnecessary, his zeal for it is well known already. I guess I assume that the hearing will be conducted with the same fairness as a proceeding in court, and I shall prepare for it in the same way. I know of no reason why I should attempt to try the matter out in the newspapers, nor shall I."

KEENE DENIES HE WILL TRAIN AT NEWMARKET

Thought That H. P. Whitney May Join With Belmont in English Campaign.

James R. Keene stated to a reporter for The Evening World that he had positively made no definite arrangements for a turf campaign in England next year. The denial by Mr. Keene was made after seeing a cable statement in a morning paper to the effect that he had joined with August Belmont in leasing Balaton Lodge at Newmarket, where the two American turfmen had arranged to train their horses next season.

"In these times of unsettled local turf conditions," said Mr. Keene, "one does not know to what ends the owners of good stables may be put. While it is possible that I may see some horses abroad next season, I have made no training arrangements for an English campaign. In fact, I look for better local conditions next year in America than at present."

From another source it was learned that Harry Payne Whitney, who is in England, was the American turfman who may have joined with Mr. Belmont in securing a lease of Balaton Lodge at Newmarket, the great English training ground.

MASKED ROBBERS BIND AND TORTURE WOMEN IN HOME

After Ransacking House They Get Away With Jewelry and Cash, but Miss \$1,500.

WASHINGTON, Pa., Aug. 11.—Three masked robbers who entered the home of Miss Marie de Garmo, in a remote part of the county, after battering down the door, bound and gagged Miss de Garmo and her niece, Miss Lizzie Hartman, the only occupants of the house, and robbed them of their jewelry and a small amount of cash. Carpets were slashed, mattresses ripped open and chest broken into. When no large sum of money was found the women were tortured until the elder one fainted. The thieves then left Miss Hartman bleeding and out at last, freeing herself from the ropes, she released her aunt.

Fifteen hundred dollars, which had been received the day before for a timber tract, was found where the robbers had overlooked it. The attack was made yesterday morning.

TEAM CRASHES INTO CAR.

Horses Frightened by Flash From Third Hall on the "L" Road.

A team of heavy work horses belonging to the Nassau News Company and attached to one of that concern's wagons took fright at 6 o'clock today at a blinding flash from the third hall of the elevated railroad at One Hundred and Forty-first street and Eighth avenue, beneath which they had been left standing by their driver, William J. King.

They dashed east through One Hundred and Forty-first street and at Lenox avenue encountered an empty car coming north. The pole of the wagon was thrust through the side of the car, the momentum of which dragged the team for half a block. One of the horses was killed and the other so badly injured that it will have to be shot.
