THREW HER BURNING BABY AND HERSELF FROM HIGH WINDOW

Mother in Frenzy of Fear Tosses Infant From Third Story and Leaps Herself—Other Child Is Burned to Death.

Mary Abruzzo, a young housewife, was working in the kitchen of her flat on the top floor of the three-story tenement at No. 26 Tompkins avenue, Brooklyn, this afternoon. Her infant son, Charles, was asleep in a perambulator at the window, and another child, Joseph, three and one-half years old, was playing on the floor near the oil stove.

In some way unexplained the fire in the burners of the stove communicated to the tank in which the oil was kept and the tank exploded. A burst of flame filled the room, setting fire to the clothing of the boy Joseph.

In a frenzy of terror the mother endeavored to extinguish the blaze. The little boy screamed in agony and broke away. He managed to dodge his mother for a little time, and then her attention was attracted by a cry from the baby.

The fire had spread to the perambulator. Mrs. Abruzzo, in a state of panic and fear, grabbed up her baby and tossed him through the window. Then, realizing that she had probably thrown him to his death she jumped after him, landing by his side in the paved court, three stories down.

Neighbors, hearing the screams of the children and the mother and noting smoke pouring from the windows of the

Abruzzo flat, turned in a fire alarm. When the firemen arrived they found little Joe burned to a crisp on the floor of the kitchen.

Mrs. Abruzzo and the infant were taken to Kings County Hospital. Both are frightfully injured, and their recovery is doubtful.

DIVE FATAL TO BOY.

Frank Saups, fifteen years old, died in St. Barnabas Hospital, Newark, today from injuries received while diving. The boy dived from a bridge into a creek on the meadows on June 14 last. He struck the bottom of the creek and his spine was fractured.

GIANTS WIN DOUBLE-HEADER AND TAKE LEAD FROM PIRATES

JOYNER'S HORSES RUN 1-2 IN THE EMPIRE FEATURE

Golden Pearl and Hessian Get Double Share of the Whirl Stake.

EMPIRE CITY RACE TRACK, YONKERS, Aug. 24.—Jack Joyner scratched Rialto from the Whirl Stakes, the feature of the card here this afternoon, and then ran one-two with Golden Pearl and Hessian, his other two starters. Fritette was third. Dugan rode Hessian and Butler rode Golden Pearl. After Hessian had run from last place and collared the leader, Magazine, at the far turn he came into the stretch with a safe advantage. He could have drawn away many lengths, but Dugan, looking around for Butler and Golden Pearl, saw they were near enough to win, so he very properly, under orders, pulled Hessian's head almost sideways, while Butler on Golden Pearl whipped his mount into the lead along the stretch.

Joyner had declared to win with Golden Pearl, and under the rules the pulling by Dugan is permissible. Both Dugan and Butler rode well to orders when they might have messed things up. Magazine, after making the early pace, tired in the stretch and Fritette was a handy third.

Elder at the Track.

Acting District-Attorney Elder of Kings County, created a sensation by appearing on the lawn just before the fourth race. A crowd collected around him as he wrote down the scratches and talked to Chief of Police Wolf. He then walked down toward the old betting ring, the crowd scurrying from all over the track to get a glimpse of the little man who had put the Jockey Club to so much bother and trouble.

As he picked his way through the crowd with Seymour Butler Mr. Elder shook hands with a dozen different bookmakers and had a smile and nod for everybody. He met John Cavannaugh and exchanged a friendly greeting, and then adjourned to the bar for some refreshments.

"I am here simply to look things over, I hear Woodlawn was near and I wanted to see where they were buried."

A wag in commenting on Elder's sudden appearance at the track remarked that he came up to get his name in the newspapers.

"His name hasn't been in print in almost two weeks and he needs a little press work," he said.

The scratching of Almee C. from the opening scramble left Ida D. a favorite. She won all the way, Butler getting her away on her toes and kept her sailing along in front. Belle Strong chased Ida D. all the way, but faltered right at the end and was beaten out by the place by Boema. Adriana closed strong, but couldn't get up for the third money. Miss Cassie and Dainty Dame were practically left at the post.

"Old Pet" Handles Flag.

Starter Cassidy was declared on his way to the track and Mr. Pettinelli stayed the first race. This accounted for the bad break. Cassidy was on the job for the second.


Trance came back to the races with all her speed, but appeared a trifle short, being under a drive through the last sixteenth to stall off Royal Captive, and won by a head.

Trance broke in her usual fashion, and right away she opened up a gap. There was daylight between her and Royal Captive in the run to the stretch. As they swung into the stretch, N-Ace sent Royal Captive up to her flank. All sent jockeys as much as fillies. Trance, however, lapsed. The rest were ever in it. Tow Hayward, the third horse, was six lengths back of Royal Captive.

Seven Scratched in Third.

Seven were scratched from the third race, and of the remaining seven, Woodcraft stood out as strongly that 2 to 5 was considered a good price on him. Woodcraft won under the whip, easily. It looked as if he could have won away off under better handling. Sunfire made the early pace, but tired as they neared the stretch turn, and Woodcraft had no trouble in getting to the front. At this point Asker D'Ore who was off badly, began to work up. He had closed a lot of ground and, as

EXPOSITION PARK, PITTSBURG, Aug. 24.—Gloom in huge chunks hangs over Pittsburg to-night, while at the Annex Hotel the New York Giants and a faithful fan bunch of loyal rooters are setting off red fire and otherwise painting Pittsburg a lurid color. Not that the players are taking any part in the proceedings. They were too tired after their great double victory to take part in any celebration, except to receive the congratulations of the fans. Then they went to bed, for their is another game coming off with the Pirates to-morrow, and they want that game also.

SECOND GAME.

To-day's first game went to the Giants due to the great pitching of Wiltse and a grand batting rally started by him in the eighth inning when four runs were scored, the final score being 4 to 1. In the second game Mathewson was invaluable and held Pittsburg to five hits and a single run, while the Giants found Leifeld an all-around player, knocking Leifeld out of the box in the fifth inning and getting two more runs off Leifeld in the seventh.

Doyle's batting, he getting four hits, and a great leaping catch of a line drive by Bridwell were only two of the many features that jammed the New York rooters full of enthusiasm.

HAZING CADETS GET NOTICE OF PUNISHMENT.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—Adj. Gen. Alsworth, of the army, today forwarded letters to cadets William T. Rossell, Jr., and Harry T. Weaver, the suspended first class men of the Military Academy at West Point, informing them of their dismissal from the academy in pursuance of orders from the President and Secretary of War. Adj. Gen. Alsworth also sent letters to the six first class men suspended from the academy for hazing, informing them that they had been suspended until June 15, 1909, when they will be ordered to return to the academy, unless they shall meantime resign. Cadet Rossell is one of the honor men of the first class and it is understood will endeavor through Congress to obtain permission to return to the academy in a lower class.
