"ROBERTS SHOT BY THUG," SAYS MRS. WILLIAMS

Declares Clubman Refused to Give Up His Money and Attempted to Personally Place Robber Under Arrest. HIGHWAYMAN WORE MASK AND LOOKED LIKE A TRAMP. Woman in Interview at Her Long Green (Md.) Home Declares Atlantic City Police Are Trying to Cover Up Own Neglect by Hinting at a Scandal.
