6,000 VOLTS KILL LINEMAN HANGING TO WIRES IN AIR

Crowd Sees Victim Shocked to Death and None Able to Give Help.

Herbert Delaney, a lineman, employed by the Westchester Lighting Company was electrocuted in mid-air early to-day at Mamaroneck on the Sound while his fellow-workers looked on in horror. Delaney, who was twenty-two years of age, was sent to the top of a forty-foot pole to string a new feed wire. While at work he lost his footing, and falling against a live wire, involuntarily seized hold of another strand to save himself from falling to the ground and thus formed a direct circuit. He hung suspended, still clutching the wire, even after the shock killed him, and other men who hurriedly climbed the pole had great difficulty in releasing his body.
