BERKMAN TRIES TO BREAK UP MEETING AND IS ARRESTED

With Emma Goldman Anarchist Forces His Way Into Cooper Union at Labor Day Demonstration of Unemployed.

Alexander Berkman, the Anarchist, who served a term in prison for shooting H. C. Frick, and a woman who was recorded at the Fifth street station-house as "Mary Smith," were arrested for inciting a riot at the Cooper Union meeting of the unemployed, presided over by J. E. How, this afternoon.

The spectacular "Red" interrupted a speech by Dr. B. L. Reisman, self-styled "King of the Hoboes," and was dragged from the hall. His companion, "Mary Smith," was especially belligerent and fought the police all the way to a cell door in the station-house.

Berkman appeared in the hall, accompanied by a woman who was recognized as Emma Goldman, the proclaimed woman leader of Anarchists.

Probably the most picturesque feature of Labor Day was the much-talked-of parade of the unemployed, down on the East Side, J. Eads How, the St. Louis agitator, who organized this demonstration, had promised to have 10,000
