PAPKE GREATEST, KETCHEL GAMEST, FIGHTER IN RING

Stanley Lost His Title Fighting Unflinchingly Until the End Came—Attell and Moran Fight Was Tame One.

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 8.—No living man ever stood up under such a beating as the new middleweight champion, "Smiling Billy" Papke, gave Stanley Ketchel here yesterday.

But the game Ketchel is not satisfied. He demands another fight and T. E. Jones, Papke's manager, says he will give him an answer to-day.

It was all Papke from the start, although at times Ketchel rallied grandly and gave his friends a chance to cheer. Papke outclassed Ketchel. That was the plain truth of it. He seemed to know every trick the Michiganian could use, and to offset it with the certainty of a mind reader.

Ketchel Battered to Pulp. At the end of the fight Papke had a slight bruise on the bridge of his nose. But Ketchel was a terrible sight. Both his eyes were closed tight. His face was battered out of shape, as if Papke had knocked him about with a baseball bat instead of two fists. His face was crooked as if his cheek bones had been beaten in. His mouth was a mere gash. His whole body was covered with unsightly lumps where Papke's iron fists had landed.

As soon as the twelfth began it was plain to see that Ketchel's finish was due. He was too weak to defend himself. Papke rushed the tottering champion into a neutral corner, whacking him with right and left on the way. Again he threw the right over and Ketchel fell. At nine he rose wearily and stood for a moment with his hands on his knees, and then he fell again and bleeding from the mouth he lay on his back.

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Papke rushed and Ketchel whipped the left over to his mouth. Instantly the Thunderbolt forced in against the blow and landed a brace of savage rights and lefts, beating Ketchel back into a corner. Here they mixed it furiously, both landing wild left and right. Then of a sudden Papke's right thudded against Ketchel's cheek bone, knocking him flat on his back. Papke, smiling, stepped back, while Ketchel struggled to rise, sprawled over on his hands and knees and turned his head toward his corner in a bewildered manner. That fearful, crushing blow had damaged him like the impact of a wooden mallet. His right eye was out and blood flowed in streams from eye and nose and mouth.

Frank L. Kramer, the national champion boxer, was defeated at the Vauxhall Club in a three-round fight with a local contender. Kramer was knocked out in the third round.



ATTELL AFRAID TO TAKE ANY CHANCES

Had Champion Been More Aggressive He Might Have Won Verdict Over Moran.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 8.—When Owen Moran and Abe Attell had completed their twenty-three rounds of fighting at the Mission street arena and Referee Jack Welch raised the hands of both featherweights as token of a draw, he gave the only decision he could have rendered.

Attell had the class and scored the more effective punches, but he let Moran do most of the leading, contenting himself for the most part with countering the other fighter was distressed at the loss, although Moran showed the marks of Attell's gloves where the American had jabbed and cut him about the face; but he was still strong and rugged.



BREDEMUS WINS ALL-ROUND TITLE

John Bredeemus, a student of Princeton University and a native of Indiana, won the all-around athletic championship of the United States yesterday afternoon at Catic Park. He rolled up a total of 5,900 points.

The championship was held in conjunction with the Irish-American Athletic Club's games, and more than 15,000 persons saw the Westerner win one of the most strenuous contests ever held in this country.
