

LILLEY NAMED FOR GOVERNOR OF CONNECTICUT

Wins Easily Over Lake and Republicans Make Nomination Unanimous.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Sept. 9.—Despite determined opposition led by prominent manufacturers of the State, representing millions of dollars and vast influence, Congressman George A. Lilley was today nominated for Governor of Connecticut by the Republicans in State Convention.

The balloting lasted thirty-five minutes and resulted as follows: Whole number cast, 571; necessary, 28. Lilley, 402; Lake, 133; Woodruff, 42. Chairman Brandegee declared Mr. Lilley the nominee of the convention. Judge Garvan moved that this be unanimous; seconded by Joseph L. Barbour, and carried with cheers.

Frank B. Weeks, of Middletown, was nominated for Lieutenant-Governor by acclamation.

The bitter feeling between the Lilley and Lake factions which has kept the State in a turmoil for weeks reached its climax in heated discussions between the leaders as the convention was opened.

The crowd at the convention was the biggest in years. Scarcely a party man of any prominence was absent. National Committeeman Charles F. Brooker and United States Senator M. G. Bulkeley were among those who were in close touch with the State Committee in endeavoring to bring about complete harmony.

The delegates poured into the theatre at 8:45, and when Senator Brandegee dropped his gavel, at 10:00, the floor seats were filled and the first balcony was crowded.

Mrs. George L. Lilley and Mrs. J. M. Ullman. The reports of the Committees on Credentials, Permanent Organization, and the list of vice-presidents were presented and adopted within a minute.

The convention was then ready for business. Mr. Brandegee thanked the convention for the honor accorded him, and announced that the first work would be the presentation of the names of

candidates for Governor, introducing former Speaker John H. Light, of Norwalk, who presented the name of George L. Lilley. Mr. Light's first reference to President Roosevelt brought cheers, and a minute later a wave of applause swept the convention at the mention of Lilley's name.

Mr. Light laughingly referred to the applause for Mr. Lilley by saying: "I guess there is no trouble about agreements."

Mr. Light was eloquent throughout his speech, and his sallies at the Democratic party brought laughter. He said he had in his pocket a letter from a Democrat who said there were thirty-eight Democrats in his town who were anxious to vote and work for Mr. Lilley. He also said that Mr. Lilley had shown his courage in rising from a sick bed to refuse to retract anything he had done in the Washington inquiry.

Light was followed by Judge E. J. Garvan, of Hartford, who amid applause presented the name of Lieutenant Governor J. Lake. As Judge Garvan stood at the speaker's desk, and with uplifted hand laid emphasis to his words, he was many times applauded.
