

BRYAN'S SCHEDULE CONTAINS NO DATE FOR SPEECH HERE

Candidate Will Be in City Several Times, but Talk Is Not Stated.

Confidence and enthusiasm beyond restraint is possessing Democratic National Headquarters. The Bryan wave that is rolling in from the West is filling the hearts of the faithful with visions of victory beyond all doubt.

The coming of Mr. Bryan into the East next week is counted on to stimulate the masses in New York, New Jersey, Delaware and Rhode Island into as great enthusiasm as prevails in the Middle West.

Strange to say, however, Mr. Bryan is not yet scheduled to make a speech in New York City. He will be in town three or four times during the week, but no public meeting has yet been arranged. Vice-chairman Hudspeht, when asked why, to-day replied:

"It has not been determined just when will be the most advisable time for Mr. Bryan to speak here. Friday, Sept. 18, is an open date in the arrangements, and we may decide to have a speech that night, possibly in Carnegie Hall. On the other hand, Mr. Bryan may defer his appearance on the platform in the city until later in the campaign, when he is expected to make a second tour into the East."

The Bryan schedule for next week in this vicinity is as follows:

Tuesday, Sept. 15, an outdoor meeting at Washington Park, Camden, N. J. Leaving there in the afternoon on a special train for Trenton, numerous stops for failed speeches will be made in small towns through southern New Jersey. The day will close with an evening speech in the opera-house at Trenton.

Leaving Trenton after the meeting Mr. Bryan will come to Newark and remain here over night, leaving early Wednesday morning for Rochester, where the evening of Sept. 18, he will make an address to the Democratic State Convention.

Leaving Rochester about midnight, he will again arrive in New York City early in the morning Sept. 17, pay a flying visit to National Headquarters and hasten to Delaware, where he will make two speeches, at Wilmington and Dover. He will return to New York on Friday, Sept. 18, for which day no plans have been made.

Leaving here Saturday morning, Sept. 19, he will go to New Haven, Conn., to visit the home of his late friend, Alexander Troup, and then hasten to Providence for a speech there. That will close the Eastern tour, and Mr. Bryan will dash for the Middle West again.

TO WORK FOR BRYAN.

Nathan Straus, merchant and philanthropist, brother of Oscar Straus, member of President Roosevelt's cabinet, visited Democratic National Headquarters to-day and made arrangements to open offices in the Hoffman House to-morrow as head of the business men's movement for Mr. Bryan.

"I firmly believe that Mr. Bryan is going to be elected President," said Mr. Straus. "The campaign that he is carrying on is the best business is wholly without foundation. His election would cause no disturbance of business conditions. On the contrary, I think it would prove beneficial for the best interests of the country."

LAWYER JACOBS HELD.

Explanation in \$75,000 Note Transaction Issued by Prisoner.

Michael Jacobs, lawyer, who was arrested yesterday in his office in the Marlborough Building, No. 47 West Thirty-fourth street, was held in the Tombs Court this afternoon in \$500 bail for examination on Sept. 25.

John Doughtitt, a decorator and dealer in art works, who is the complainant, was not in court, and on the request of Jacobs' lawyer, Assistant District Attorney Knudsenberger consented to an adjournment.

JUDGE PARKER TO PRESIDE AT THE CONVENTION

He and Morgan J. O'Brien Will Each Have a Chance at Rochester.

Chairman Conners, of the Democratic State Committee, announced to-day that the State convention next week in Rochester will be presided over by Alton B. Parker and Morgan J. O'Brien, both retired jurists of much distinction. Which one will be permanent and which temporary chairman is yet to be decided.

Coincident with this announcement is the mention of another Judge as candidate for Governor—Martin J. Keogh, of Westchester County, a justice of the Supreme Court for the Ninth Department, whose term of office expires next year. The present arrangement is to have him placed in nomination by Augustus Thomas, who will head the Westchester delegation to the convention.

Question Unsettled.

At both State Headquarters and Tammany Hall it was said that the nomination for Governor continues to be an unsettled question. The candidates mentioned without special favor from "Bosses" Murphy and Conners are: William Sulzer, Lieut-Gov. Chanler, Martin Littleton, Herman Ridder, Justice Keogh, W. Caryl Ely and half a dozen other possibilities. Justice Gaynor, of Brooklyn, is understood to have positively refused to allow his name to be considered.

The Republican State Convention at Saratoga will have Secretary of State Elliot Hook for both temporary and permanent chairman. The nomination of Gov. Hughes is generally considered to be assured. Gen. Stewart L. Woodford, who placed Gov. Hughes in nomination for President at the Chicago Convention, is scheduled to do similar duty at the State convention.

Place for Hedges.

Job E. Hedges, who named the Governor two years ago, is now on the slate for nomination as attorney-general. There is much discussion among the Republican machine leaders as to the nominees for other State officers. The bosses consider that when they have nominated Gov. Hughes' successor, he should be made to independent public sentiment, and they will fix up the balance of the ticket according to their own desires.


