

### WATER TRAFFIC BADLY CRIPPLED BY DENSE FOG

Many Vessels Held Up at  
Quarantine and Ferries Run  
on Haphazard Schedule.

#### HUDSON TUNNEL BUSY.

Float Load of Calves Is Ship-  
wrecked Off Bedloe's  
Island.

Water traffic was seriously crippled during the early hours to-day by the dense smoky fog that overhung the land, bay and rivers. Several ferries were unable to run when the mist was at its thickest, and all river craft was on a haphazard schedule for many hours. In the lower bay nothing moved. The revenue cutter did not go down to quarantine to meet the North German Lloyd liners Koenig Albert and Buelow, which were due this morning. In the Narrows the fog was as thick as custard, and had been since midnight. The thirty-ninth street ferry did not attempt to make its long run to South Brooklyn, and the Hamilton avenue lines were out of commission for two hours. Until 8.33, when a suggestion of a breeze began to clear away the mist off the Battery, the Staten Island boats were running from twenty to thirty minutes late. The Ellis Island ferry did not run for two trips, and the Pennsylvania and Central Railroad ferries made only half their usual schedule. The Lackawanna and Erie ferries were delayed on all their early runs, and there was so much fog that the suburban trains barely crept along. Owing to the fog on the river the Hudson tunnel from Hoboken did a rush business, the trains going out jammed under three minutes headway. The United Fruit Company's steamer Bradford, which cleared quarantine last night, was marooned by the fog off Bedloe's Island. Nearby was a big Lackawanna tug, towing a float load of calves. The tug got stuck off the island at midnight and remained there, two hundred and fifty "veals" protesting clamorously.

### FALLS IN HUNT OF THE MEADOWBROOKS

George Godfrey Goes Down  
With His Horse and Is  
Unconscious an Hour.

HEMPSTEAD, N. Y., Sept. 23.—Henry Godfrey, one of the well-known members of the Meadowbrook Hunt Club, was severely injured to-day while taking part in a drag hunt held by the Meadowbrook Hunt, of Westbury. The event was the first that has been held this season, and the hounds, which are a new pack and very fast, started out from Westbury at a fast clip and crossed the Warner Baltazar farm, where there are some stiff fences. While Mr. Godfrey was about to put his hunter over the third fence the horse took off too quickly and fell and rolled over on the ground, with Mr. Godfrey partly under him. Mr. Godfrey was unconscious for ever an hour and several members who had pulled from the chase were much alarmed. After a time he left the field in a carriage for his home at Roslyn.

### HUNTED MAN FIRES SHOTS AT POLICE IN LUMBER YARD

Driven to Bay, Fugitive  
Stands Off Pursuers Amid  
Piles of Timber

After a pistol battle with the police, who surrounded him in a lumber yard at the Boulevard and Camilla streets, Astoria, at 3 o'clock this morning, James Mustorio, a porter in Stack's Casino, opposite the yard, made his escape in the fog when a milkman drove his wagon between the police and a pistol-wielder they were pursuing. Mustorio had shot four times at Clifford McBride, an ironworker, who created a disturbance in the Casino soon after midnight. McBride lives at No. 27 Welling street, and is described as being quiet and peaceable. He and Mustorio had a fight in the Casino, however, in which Mustorio got the worst of it. McBride stayed in the place for an hour after the row and then started home. Mustorio was waiting for him outside with a pistol. He fired four times at him, hitting him in the hand and inflicting three slight scalp wounds. McBride, almost fainting from loss of blood, made his way to the Ninety-second street ferry. There he was found by a conductor of the Queens Railroad. The conductor notified the police and they had McBride sent to St. John's Hospital. Before he went, he told them of the row with Mustorio and they started to get the man. Mustorio knew whom they were after when he saw the policeman come into the place, and hid in the lumber yard. The police surrounded it, while some of their number went through the alleys between the piles of timber. Policeman Mohrman had just turned a corner when a bullet whizzed past his head. It was followed by two more. Then Mustorio broke cover and ran out into the Boulevard, with the police after him. Just as they were on his heels a milk wagon driver turned into the Boulevard and they lost their man, who dodged up a side street and in the fog got away.

### GOLFERS START IN METROPOLITAN CHAMPIONSHIP

Alex Smith Leads in the First  
Round on Baltusrol  
Links.

SHORT HILLS, N. J., Sept. 23.—Alex Smith led on the first round this afternoon in the third Metropolitan Open Golf championship held at the Baltusrol Club. His card was 73, Gilbert Nichols being second at 75. Smith played with marked steadiness, going out in 27 and returning in 38. Nichols on the other hand had a remarkable 34 going out, but was 41 coming back, although the last half is no more difficult.  
George Low, the present title holder, went into the air on the tenth, taking ten strokes there against bogey 4. It will be a miracle if he can catch up after that.  
There were about fifty starters, nearly all of the leading professionals of the Atlantic slope being entered, following the taking down of the bars. While several expert amateurs are included their list is not especially noteworthy.  
Alexander Ross, the title holder of 1907, took 80, which is likely to keep him out of the class of possibilities. The best of the amateurs were A. G. Lockwood and F. R. Upton Jr., each of whom made 81. Lockwood was runner-up in the recent Greater New York championship and has held the Bay State title, while Upton has three times been State of Maine champion.

#### DIRIGIBLE BALLOONS TO RACE AT MORRIS PARK.

Aeronautic Society Plans a Spectacular Contest—Arranging for Flight of a Biplane.  
The Aeronautic Society will hold a race for dirigible balloons at Morris Park next month. Correspondence has been entered into with prominent air navigators and it is believed that the arrangements will result in the most spectacular air race ever witnessed in this country.  
Experiments in testing various features of heavier-than-air machines are going on daily at Morris Park, the society's experimentation grounds. Two completed flying machines in which flight will be attempted within a short time are the helicopter of W. R. Kimball and the biplane of J. R. Williams, of Richmond Hill. It is expected that the first flight of the Kimball machine, with the inventor on board will take place next week.  
Arrangements have been made for the building and testing of eight other machines at Morris Park. Some of these are partly constructed, others will be built entirely at the park from plans and models which have been completed.

### CUBANS ATTACK ACTING MINISTER IN HAVANA HOTEL

United States Charge on the  
Island Struck and Gashed  
While He and Friend Talks.

HAVANA, Sept. 23.—J. Cornell Tarrier, Charge d'Affaires of the American Legation in the absence of Minister Edwin B. Morgan, was assaulted by one of several Cubans in this city last night. Mr. Tarrier was sitting with Capt. Granville Fortesque in a well-known restaurant located next to the Hotel Inglaterra. Capt. Fortesque was formerly in the American Army, but he is now on the staff of Major Slocum, Supervisor of the Rural Guard.  
The assault was unprovoked, and several Cubans were concerned in it. One of them, without giving Mr. Tarrier a chance to rise from his seat, struck him heavily in the face, cutting him severely over the right eye. The assailant escaped, but his arrest and identification is expected to-day.

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### DREAMS HIS FRIEND IS DEAD AND FINDS BODY

W. T. Reynolds After Visit to  
the Morgue Locates Jones  
at Brooklyn Hotel.

William T. Reynolds, a designer, with offices on High street, Maspeth, L. I., awoke at midnight with a premonition that his life-long friend, Harry L. Jones, also a designer, was dead. He arose quickly, dressed himself and set out to find him.  
Jones had been missing from Maspeth four days. No trace of him was found in any of his haunts. At 7 o'clock to-day Reynolds walked into the Brooklyn Morgue and anxiously scanned the faces of four bodies.  
"I know he is dead and he hasn't been dead only a few hours," he told the Morgue keeper.  
From the dead house he was directed to Police Headquarters. He was told to call up the hospitals. Finally he remembered that Jones occasionally was absent for days at a period, usually spending his time in high class hotels alone. So he went to the Clarendon. There he found that Jones had registered at noon yesterday. With a bell boy, Flave Green, he went to the room. Jones will find him dead across the bed, probably with an empty morphine box near," he told the boy.  
Jones was stretched across the bed, dead. He had succumbed during the night to an overdose of morphine, of which he was a victim.
