EARTHQUAKE OFF SHORE KILLS FOUR ON PACIFIC LINER

Steamer Tossed Like Cork by Submarine Upheaval and Passengers Felled.

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 24.—Advices received here today from Acapulco are to the effect that two heavy earthquake shocks were felt yesterday off that port. The sea was greatly agitated, and broke in tremendous waves. The Cosmos line steamer Radames, from San Francisco Sept. 8 for Hamburg, was caught and tossed about like a cork.

The passengers and crew were thrown to the deck by the onslaught of the waves. Four persons were killed and several others injured by rolling spars and falling woodwork. The earthquake was barely perceptible on shore.

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GIVES AIRSHIP PATENTS AWAY IN HIS LAST WILL

Entire Estate of Arthur de Bousset Consists of Flying Machine Inventions.

The will of Arthur de Bousset, who died Jan. 11, 1906, died to-day in the Surrogate's office, discloses that the entire estate consisted of patents and unpatented inventions for airships.

He was a physician and seventy-six years of age when he drew his will on May 8, 1904. The petition was filed by Maxwell Hill Elliott, of No. 27 Broadway, so that the widow, Naomi de Bousset, whose address is mentioned as 1319 H street, N. W., Washington, D. C., might be served by citation.

To Mrs. Jessie Kappeler, a dentist, of No. 162 Madison street, he leaves one-half of Great Britain in 1908 for a propeller for airships and a similar interest on the same invention patented in this country the year previous.

To Thomas P. F. Donohue, of No. 810 Ely avenue, Astoria, he also leaves a similar interest in his patent. One-half interest had already been transferred to Charles A. MacReady, of No. 109 Broadway, to whom the patent was given, leaving the residue of his estate and all his inventions, whether patented or otherwise, to the said Thomas P. F. Donohue, who is to have the right to such of his heirs who might make claim within a year of his demise.

CRUISER YANKEE STILL ON ROCK; TUGS AIDING HER

Little Chance of Freeing War Craft Until Big Naval Vessels Get to Work.

NEWPORT, R. I., Sept. 23.—Two tugs and a wrecker from the Boston Wrecking Company were alongside the United States cruiser Yankee to-day, ready to assist the cruiser in escaping from the dangerous position on Spindle Rock where she struck yesterday during a heavy fog.

A wireless despatch received from the stranded cruiser to-day asked that the representative of a New York wrecking company come to the scene of the wrecked immediately. The message stated that there were thirty feet of water under the port side of the Yankee at high tide and twenty-four feet under her stern, and that when the tide was high she raised aft.

The naval tug Chickasaw was sent to the Yankee from the torpedo station to-day, towing a lighter to which may be removed a portion of the cruiser's coal. It is the opinion in naval circles here that the Yankee has sustained serious damage.

MAN MILLINER GONE, HIS DEBTS \$25,000

William Hinkel, Jr. was to-day appointed receiver for Francis A. Hayes, who conducted a fashionable millinery establishment at 87 West Thirty-sixth street, and who, his family says, disappeared two weeks ago.

A member of the firm of Ebsstein Bros., attorneys for the receiver, at No. 320 Broadway, said to-day that the Police Department would be asked to look for Mr. Hayes unless some news of his whereabouts was received soon.

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SUES AGAIN FOR LITTLE GIRL HE HAD GIVEN AWAY

Ralph Sozzo Once More Fails to Satisfy Court He is Proper Custodian.

Mildred Sozzo Gabarini, a child of three years, was to-day again the subject of a legal battle between her father, Ralph Sozzo, a ribbon manufacturer, and Fred Gabarini, his boss truckman, who lives with his wife at No. 26 Beach street. The case was heard before Justice Gerard in the Supreme Court to-day.

Sozzo had lived with the mother of little Mildred two years when she was born in 1905. The mother died eight months later, and Sozzo gave the baby to the truckman.

Later he acquired another wife. Meantime the eight-month-old babe had grown into a pretty child and Sozzo discovered that he wanted her. But the truckman and his wife loved the child, and when R. E. Weldon, fog Sozzo, sued out a writ of habeas corpus, C. Lox Brooke opposed the writ, drawing the story from Sozzo's own lips in testimony.

Justice Goff dismissed the writ, declaring that it was plain that the truckman and his wife were the true lovers of and most fit custodians for the child. Morton was arraigned before Judge Swann in the Court of Federal Sessions and bail was fixed at \$5,000, which was promptly furnished.


