

PETER FORRESTER MAY BE SET FREE AFTER FOUR YEARS

Ludlow Street Jail, the Tombs
and Matteawan Have
Sheltered Him.

There was a trace of weariness in the voice of the clerk of Part I. of the Court of General Sessions to-day when he called "Peter Forrester to the bar." A white-haired, shuffling old man was led in by two attendants and deposited in a chair inside the rail.

Peter Forrester has been a familiar figure about the Criminal Courts Building in the last four and a half years. Time after time he has been led in by two attendants and deposited in the Tombs after lawyers had argued pro and con over his case. His place of residence during that period has alternated between Ludlow Street Jail, the Tombs and Matteawan Insane Asylum. Forrester is about seventy years old. At one time he was a leading figure in Wall street. In the palmy days of Jay Gould, Forrester led the Gould campaigns on the floor of the Stock Exchange. To-day he is broken down, physically and financially, in disgrace and within a few weeks the question of his sanity will be determined. The District-Attorney called him to

court to-day because there are three old indictments standing against him upon which it appears impossible to secure a conviction, although he once pleaded guilty to the charges contained in them. At the request of the District-Attorney Judge Foster appointed a commission in lunacy to examine the old man and pass upon his mental standing.

The commission is made up of Dr. Alan M. Lane Hamilton, Dr. Frank W. Robertson and Hugo Blumenthal, a banker. If Forrester is declared sane the indictments against him will be dismissed upon the representations of his counsel that he has arranged to settle some civil suits having to do with the offense for which he was indicted.

In 1888 Forrester was appointed trustee for the estate of Mrs. Lucinda Dougherty, who was survived by two minor children. The elder child became of age in 1903 and Forrester was called upon for an accounting. It was found that he had sunk the whole estate, valued at about \$100,000, in worthless Western mines.

Three indictments charging grand larceny were found against him in March, 1907. He was imprisoned in the Tombs until Dec. 7, 1907, when he entered a plea of guilty before Judge McMahon and was remanded for sentence.

Sent to Matteawan.

On Dec. 29, 1906, Fred House, now a city magistrate, appeared before Judge McMahon in behalf of Forrester and had the plea withdrawn. A commission was appointed to inquire into Forrester's sanity. He was pronounced insane on Feb. 19, 1906, and sent to Matteawan.

A few weeks later his attorney secured a writ of habeas corpus which moved him back to the Tombs. Then the Appellate Division decided that the commission had been illegally appointed and the District-Attorney recommended Forrester's discharge upon his own recognizance.

Forrester was discharged, but immediately was rearrested by the Sheriff on warrants drawn in civil suits brought by the Dougherty heirs. He was then sent to Ludlow Street Jail, and at frequent intervals since has been called before the Court of General Sessions on one motion or another.

His counsel, William Hawkins, told Judge Foster that if Forrester is released from custody the civil suits against him can be settled. It is understood that he has made restitution to some extent to the Dougherty heirs.
