

YOUNG WOMAN IN AUTO HELPS TO CAPTURE THIEF

Sees Hold-Up of Jeweller's Wife on Street and Pursues Highwayman.

PICKS UP A POLICEMAN.

After Wild Chase and a Fight, "Hotel Clerk Out of Work" Is Caught at "L" Station.

James Graham, a former hotel clerk, arrested after an exciting hot chase in which a young woman in an auto was conspicuous last night, was held in \$2,000 for trial on charges of assault and robbery by Magistrate Kernochan today.

Robert Lissauer, No. 311 Park avenue, whom Graham knocked down with a blow on the nose when she resisted him as he seized her chateleine bag, appeared in court with a bruised face. She positively identified Graham. The latter insisted that he ran when he heard the shouts of the crowd. He was formerly employed in the Astor Hotel, he says.

Mrs. Lissauer, who is the wife of a member of the firm of Lambert, Brothers, Jewellers, of No. 363 Third avenue, was walking on Madison avenue, near Seventy-seventh street, yesterday afternoon, with her friend, Mrs. Gill. On her left wrist Mrs. Lissauer carried a chateleine bag valued at \$300, in which there was \$50. There were few people in the street at the time, and as the two women approached the corner, Graham, who was well dressed, crossed from the opposite side.

Struck Her in Face. Graham got behind Mrs. Lissauer and, as the two women were busily talking, sprang upon her. He pinioned her arms and made a grab at the handbag. He did not succeed in getting it free, as Mrs. Lissauer put up a good fight. "You can't get away," said Graham. "I want that bag."

Then he struck Mrs. Lissauer full in the face and knocked her down. Snatching the bag and breaking the gold chain which held it to the woman's wrist, Graham ran up the avenue. Mrs. Lissauer and Mrs. Gill cried for help.

It happened that a young woman passing in a big touring car saw the entire performance. "Stop," she shouted to her chauffeur; "help that woman."

The chauffeur jumped out and made a lunge at the highwayman with a steel wrench. Graham wrested it away and resumed his flight. The chauffeur got in the automobile and gave chase.

Throw Away Hand Bag. Having thrown away the bag, the thief bent all his energies to escaping. He ran through Seventy-seventh street to Third avenue, the machine at his heels. Policeman Hensler saw the chase and joined it. He got in the automobile and the pursuit continued. By dodging about Graham wrested it away and resumed his flight. The chauffeur got in the automobile and gave chase.

"VERY QUIET ELECTION," ANNOUNCES BINGHAM.

No Violence, and Only One Complaint Against a Policeman Up to Noon.

Commissioner Bingham said at noon that the police of five boroughs had reported an unusually quiet election with no violence.

"There was only one complaint against a policeman up to noon," said Gen. Bingham, "and that was in a case where the policeman thought he was instructed to do the challenging. Each policeman at the polling places is supplied with a list of Supt. Learly's challenges, and also warrants in cases of alleged violence. I thought it would create confusion over the new election laws. I have invited the heads of city departments to hear the returns at Police Headquarters to-night. Mayor McMillan will not be present. I understand he has a private wire in his home."

POLICE FORCE OF OYSTER BAY IS GONE

His Name Is De Bouche, and Wife of Leading Caterer Also Is Missing.

The Police Force of Oyster Bay, where the Presidents come from, is missing. The name of Oyster Bay's Police Force is Frederick De Bouche.

The force was organized some months ago by buying De Bouche a large German silver badge and a set of wrist nippers. He came well recommended, having formerly been a member of the uniformed department in Long Island City.

Folk had been remarking lately that De Bouche spent a good deal of his time hanging around the kitchen of a prominent Oyster Bay restaurant and oyster stew emporium, but nothing really happened until last Saturday night, when there was great excitement on account of a shanty burning down right in the heart of town.

After the fire was out, it is alleged that the Force imbibed heavily, and shortly thereafter the Force's wife went to look for him, and found him, so she now states, in the back room of the restaurant in company with several other persons. He promised to come home, and he did so, but yesterday he left, and he hasn't been seen since.

One of Oyster Bay's leading caterers is also trying to get trace of his wife, who is also missing, making a grand total of two mysterious disappearances in one day, which is a world's record for Oyster Bay.

Lord Avebury, Type of That Class, Says "If Bryan Is Elected We Shall Be Uneasy."

LONDON, Nov. 2.—Mr. Bryan's election would be profoundly unpopular with the big financial interests in London. Lord Avebury, a typical representative of them, said: "We hope here that Taft will win. If Bryan is elected we shall be uneasy. Some of his speeches were not reassuring, on the nationalization of railways particularly. We fear the discouragement of private enterprise if he becomes President."


