

DIAMOND SHINES AS WIFE BEATER, SAYS HIS SPOUSE

Accuses Him of Frequent Attacks in Her Suit for Separation.

Nathan Diamond, head of the firm of N. Diamond & Brother, the leading dry goods merchants of Phoenix, Ariz., has been sued by his wife in this city for a separation. He says they were merely spending their regular summer vacation in New York and vicinity when she brought the suit on the ground of alleged cruelty.

But Justice McCall evidently believed the wife's allegation that they had in reality come back to live in the land of their courtship and marriage after nine years spent in successful trade in the land of the Apaches, for he to-day allowed her suit to stand, and ordered Nathan to pay her \$50 monthly, almost and \$15 for a lawyer to prosecute her case.

Mrs. Diamond recited that they were married in Brooklyn Aug. 27, 1899, and returned to Arizona before the end of the year. Their three children were born in Phoenix.

"We were very happy until our boy Bert was born," said Mrs. Diamond. "But Nathan could not understand why Bert was blond complexion while he and I were neither of us that complexion."

The wife's charges. She says her husband abused her, making vile charges against her, and after that frequently absented himself for days at a time. As the town was full of Mexicans and other doubtful characters, and being afraid to be alone at night, she took the children and went to her mother. For this she declares she got more abuse.

They returned to New York to live, she says, last June. They spent the summer at Bath Beach. While there she says Diamond beat her because she visited a bowling alley.

They went to board at No. 128 West Ninety-eighth street on returning from Bath Beach, and there, she says, she was abused again for going with the children down to the public park while he snored on a sofa in the room.

But Mr. Diamond denies all this and says that he followed her through the park at Bath Beach while his wife flirted with a man named Well.

He accuses Well. "My wife had told me," said Diamond, "that she did not come up here to be merely a nurse maid for my children, that she was going to have a good time and I could do what I liked. I followed my wife and Well. They walked with their arms around each other and stopped in a dark place to kiss and hug each other."

Then, on the spur of the moment, my blood boiling in me with rage, I approached him and with strong language I told him that it was an outrage for him to break up a happy home."

Then the Arizona merchant said that Well turned up as a boarder at the Ninety-eighth street boarding house and that in the gloaming of the parlor he saw his wife and Well in the cozy corner embracing each other. He also testified that his domicile is in Arizona and he should be there to attend to his business.

But under Justice McCall's order he will have to stay in New York long enough to defend his wife's suit for a separation.
