

# STABS KINSMEN WHO HAD REFUSED TO SUPPORT HIM

Joseph Nelson Lies in Wait for Brother and His Sister's Husband.

## ONE VICTIM IS DYING.

Crowd in Bronx Follow Assailant, Who Is Captured After a Long Chase.

Enraged at his election from the home of his brother, Louis, and his brother-in-law, William Rosenfeld, at No. 1702 Fulton avenue, the Bronx, Joseph Nelson, twenty-two years old, a painter, hid himself behind a hedge in Crotona Park this morning and, as the two men walked by, rushed out and stabbed them both.

He drove a long-bladed knife between the shoulders of his brother and into the left lung, and then, before his sister's husband could raise a hand to defend himself, stabbed him in the back. Both injured men dropped to the pavement unconscious, and the painter fled.

Half a dozen men who had seen the assault formed the nucleus of a great crowd that pursued the stabber for half a mile, finally capturing him at Third avenue and One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street and turning him over to the police.

Louis Nelson dying. Louis Nelson, who is also a painter, was taken to the Fordham Hospital in a dying condition. Rosenfeld's wound was less serious and he has a good chance of recovery.

He was able to make a statement to the public, in which he said that his brother-in-law was a worthless young man who had been put out of his brother's home because of his bad habits. The brother and brother-in-law threw him out on Saturday night, and told him never to enter the place again.

Early this morning Joseph Nelson was seen loitering about the entrance to his brother's home with an open knife in his hand. Joseph Ehekach, of No. 1447 Hostin road, saw him conceal himself in the bushes as his kinsman and his brother-in-law came out.

Before Ehekach could warn the two men, however, the painter had rushed upon them and struck them down with his knife.

He was arraigned before Magistrate House in the Morrisania Court and held without bail on the charge of stabbing his brother and in \$1,500 bail for the assault upon his brother-in-law.

# CITY OVERPAYS MANY OFFICIALS, METZ SAYS

Comptroller Threatens to Give List That Would "Stagger Taxpayers."

Comptroller Metz said today that he is prepared to call "Little Tim" Sullivan's bluff and tell the Aldermen a lot about high salaries of officials who make little return to the city.

Sullivan said yesterday, at a meeting of the Finance Committee: "If city employees are being paid too high salaries, this committee wants to know all about it."

"I'll tell them about it if they really want to know," said the Comptroller today. "There are office-holders in this administration who have such a large surplus of salary that they are able to take long vacations in Europe each summer. I can give a list of overpaid officials and employees that would stagger taxpayers—that is, if Alderman Sullivan really wants the facts."

Sullivan is said to be holding up in the committee a request for \$20,000 which the Comptroller wants to pay the Municipal Research accountants in the Finance Department.

The committee is holding hearings on the 1909 budget and is seeking a means of reducing it.
