DISCORD IN HOME OF HAMMERSTEIN'S CORNET PLAYER

Mrs. Nessbaum Says Husband Threatened to Kill Her With His Instrument.

HE WANTS HIS RECORDS.

Also His Three Operatic Puppies—She Asks for Half His Salary.

However delightfully the notes of Abraham Nessbaum's cornet might have harmonized with the other instruments in the Manhattan Opera-House orchestra, his life at home for the last three days, he told Magistrate Harris, in the Harlem Court today, has been one hideous, racking discord.

Mrs. Nessbaum, who is charged by her husband with abducting the furniture of their flat at No. 698 Lenox avenue, together with a dozen cornet photographs records of her husband's name, Oscar, Mary, Garden, and Dalmore—only the name of the last will

have to be changed for personal reasons—says that the eternal foot-trotting of the cornet drove her to be contributory cause to said discord.

The Nessbaums had their day in court yesterday and also the day before that, and they will have another one tomorrow. Out of the maze of charges and counter-charges, as intricate as a Strauss score, loomed up the fact that yesterday after they left court the cornetist is alleged to have threatened his wife, next with the doublet sword and then with a pistol. Then he went to rehearsal. In the mean time Mrs. Nessbaum had telephoned to Police Headquarters and moved the furniture, the puppets and the records to her mother's home, next door, and put a padlock on the door. The detectives arrived during the transfer of the furniture.

"Arrest my husband? Certainly," said Mrs. Nessbaum, hastily stuffing the wrongly named pup into the bell of a gold solo cornet. "Just wait here till he comes home! I'm too busy to bother."

And the good woman went back to her mother-in-law's music and a piano, whichever way you like to put it, and the detectives went back to Headquarters.

BEST DANCER IN HARLEM DIES IN MIDST OF WALTZ

James Dineen Collapses in Arms of Partner and Is Dead When Doctor Comes.

James Dineen, Harlem's most graceful dancer, waltzed himself to death early today at Majestic Hall, in One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, between Park and Lexington avenues. He lived at No. 518 Sixth avenue and was twenty-one years old.

Last night the Treasury Social Club gave its annual entertainment at the hall, and young Dineen, as one of its most prominent members and most sought after dancers, went early with his mother and several friends. With blue eyes, curly hair and a handsome face, he would have been popular with the young women even if he hadn't been such a graceful dancer.

Shortly after midnight he began to complain of fatigue, but kept on dancing. He appeared to be nearly exhausted when the orchestra struck up "The Merry Widow."

FATHER AND MOTHER START WIDE SEARCH FOR DAUGHTER

MILLVILLE, N. J., Jan. 7.—An aged couple of this city have set out to search for the daughter they had mourned for in silence for six years. She is Jeanette Simon. Her father, Jacob Simon, is sixty-six years of age. He is a veteran of the Civil war, runs a grocery business at Sixth and Pine streets, lives in a handsome home and is wealthy. He and his wife had but one child, Jeanette, who as she grew up developed a tendency to wander.

She left home several times but her parents sought her out on each occasion and brought her back. She was finally told that if she went away again she need never return and that her parents would never see her.

She did leave again. That was six years ago, and the father and mother kept grieving, however, and at length her health began to fail, and some time ago the father, who now admits that he felt a blank in his life, began to make inquiries. As due to the whereabouts of the daughter were obtained and Simon has now arranged to begin a systematic search, beginning in and around Philadelphia, and he will extend it if no trace of the girl is obtained. HE ORDERED \$2,000 WORTH OF CLOTHES

But Bank Clerk Marked His Check "N. G." and Young "Heir" Goes to Jail.

Prof. H. Garrison is a strapping young six-footer from Philadelphia, who lives in bachelor apartments at No. 94 Forest avenue, the Bronx, has an income and a taste for clothes.

Just how much the income is, he alone knows, but he told Louis Blau, a tailor, of No. 108 West One Hundred and Fourth street, two days ago that it was \$25,000, and, having just received it and banked it with the Fifth Avenue Trust Company, he would like to have \$2,000 worth of clothes made.

As he owed Blau \$30 for various riding, walking, golfing and evening togs, for which he had given a note, Mr. Garrison airily tendered the tailor a check for \$20, and received and destroyed the note.

The next day the tailor went downtown to order \$1,500 worth of cloth, which he thought would suffice to build a part of the contemplated order of Garrison's. He also tendered the \$20 check for payment.

What they told him at the bank window made him ponder over his cloth order in a hurry. The substance of the teller's remarks was "N. G."

Then the tailor got a warrant for Garrison's arrest, and when last night that young man strolled into the store to see how things were getting along he was greeted by Detective Broncke.

In the Harlem Court today Garrison was held in lieu of \$500 bail. His relatives from Philadelphia were in court and promised to have the tailor satisfied by tomorrow. In the meantime, some of Garrison's clothing (amounting to \$2,000) was sent to a cell.
