

### CARVALHO, CLARK AND MERRILL ARE HELD FOR LIBEL

#### Officers of Star Co. Secure Supreme Court Writ for Review of Case.

Solomon S. Carvalho, Bradford Merrill and Edward H. Clark, respectively president, treasurer and secretary of the Star Company, were held by Magistrate Moss in the Centre Street Police Court this afternoon on a charge of criminal libel preferred by John D. Rockefeller Jr. The Star Company is the corporation which publishes William Randolph Hearst's morning newspaper.

Magistrate Moss, in announcing his decision, said he felt it his duty to hold the defendants, the publication of an allegedly libellous article having been clearly shown, and the three defendants being named in the newspaper, as required by law, as the persons responsible for the publication.

Messrs. Carvalho, Merrill and Clark were placed in the custody of Lieut. Raynes, of the District-Attorney's office, immediately after the Magistrate's decision was announced.

Clarence J. Shearn, counsel for the accused men, resourcefully hurried to the Supreme Court, Special Term, and secured a writ of habeas corpus and a writ of certiorari commanding a review of the evidence taken in the police court.

The prisoners were accordingly escorted by their police custodian to the County Courthouse, where arguments were heard on the writs.

The three prisoners were brought before Justice Davis in the Supreme Court in the custody of Lieut. Edward F. Raynes.

At the request of Assistant District-Attorney Garvan the hearing on the writ was adjourned until Thursday, and the prisoners were paroled in the custody of Mr. Shearn.

The three were held under the new law, as the chief officers of the Hearst publications. The contention on which the writ was obtained was that the new law applies only to civil suits and not to criminal actions.

### SLAYER PLEADS GUILTY.

Daniel Galvin, twenty-two years old, of No. 229 East One Hundredth street, who shot and killed William Leonard, June 27 last, pleaded guilty to-day before Judge Foster in General Sessions to manslaughter in the first degree. Galvin had been indicted for murder in the first degree.

Assistant District-Attorney Hart recommended the acceptance of the plea. Judge Foster remanded Galvin until Jan. 20 for sentence.

### CROWDS PAY HONOR AT RABBI'S FUNERAL

The funeral of Israel Cooper, one of the best known Jewish cantors in New York, was held to-day, services being conducted in two synagogues. Twelve hundred attended the services, while thousands lined the streets of the lower east side while the funeral procession passed from one synagogue to another.

Mr. Cooper died yesterday at his home, No. 1208 Washington avenue, Bronx, in his seventieth year. The funeral services began this morning at the Sons of Israel Kalvari Synagogue, No. 11 Pike street. One feature was the singing in the orthodox fashion by one hundred well known cantors with whom Mr. Cooper had sung. There were also ritual and eulogistic addresses. Rabbi Mann, of the synagogue, conducted the services, with Rabbi Z. Rabinowitz.

The body was then taken to the Beth Medrasch Synagogue, in Norfolk street, where similar services were conducted. Two hundred and fifty policemen lined the streets while the funeral cortege moved. At the conclusion of the services at Beth Medrasch the body was taken to Bayside Cemetery.

Mr. Cooper is survived by seven children, one being Bert Cooper, manager for Cohen & Harris, the theatrical firm; another is Harry Cooper, of the Empire City Quartet, while a third is Louis Cooper, music publisher. Miss Sadie Cooper, a daughter, is one of the best known of New York's women lawyers.
