

FAKE 'DEWEY HERO' GIVEN SIX-YEAR SING SING TERM

Fay Passed Bad Checks in 1907 and Only Left Trenton Prison on Jan. 2.

One of the many bogus heroes who claim to have fought with Dewey in Manila Bay was sent to Sing Sing today to serve a term of six years and eight months. His name is Charles E. Fay, and his record as a crook stretches back to 1874, when he was convicted in Boston of forgery in his nineteenth year, and sentenced to prison.

Living precariously by his wits, Fay dodged or inhabited jails and prisons until 1888, when the first flush of victory in war fired every American heart. When Admiral Dewey came to New York with the Olympia Fay appeared in the role of a hero. He represented himself as a lieutenant in the navy who had taken quite a prominent part in the Manila Bay engagement.

"In fact," Fay would remark, "it was I who cut the cable and thus shut off the Admiral from communication with Washington."

Fay lived well on this imposture for years. His bogus record as a hero enabled him to pass forged checks, which was his method of raising money.

In February, 1907, he forged the name of Samuel E. Hunter, of No. 82 Dey street, to two checks, one for \$140 and one for \$80, and passed them. Then he shipped to Newark, N. J., where he was arrested for another forgery and sent to prison at Trenton.

He was released on Jan. 2 and took the first train from Trenton to New York. But he hadn't been here a day before a Central Office man who knew him picked him up and found that there was an indictment against him for passing the Hunter checks.

Fay entered a plea of guilty before Judge Mulqueen in the Court of General Sessions to-day, expecting to get a very light sentence. He almost fainted when the Judge gave him six years and eight months. A lawyer who represented him said he was a sick man and would not live to complete his term.

SHEARN RAISES NEW POINT IN LIBEL WAR

Claims a Corporation Cannot Entertain Malice and Indictment Is Defective.

Clarence J. Shearn, counsel for William Randolph Hearst and Mr. Hearst's publications, raised a new point in libel today before Justice Dowling in the Criminal Branch of the Supreme Court. The occasion was Mr. Shearn's appearance in connection with an indictment for criminal libel which has been found against The Star Company, publisher of Mr. Hearst's morning paper on complaint of John D. Rockefeller.

Mr. Shearn served notice upon the court and District Attorney Jerome that he would be ready on Monday morning to argue a motion for the dismissal of the indictment. Mr. Jerome asked to be enlightened as to the grounds upon which such a motion would be based.

In response to this Mr. Shearn said he held that the indictment was illegal, because of the incapacity of a corporation to publish a libel with malice and intent. In other words he holds that a corporation cannot entertain malice, and without malice there can be no criminal libel.

The District Attorney listened to Mr. Shearn's explanation with a cheerful grin, and informed the Court that all Mr. Shearn was looking for was delay. There was some argument on both sides, and Justice Dowling finally said he would listen to Mr. Shearn on Monday morning, and give him a chance to establish his contention that a corporation is incapable of harboring malice.
