

**BUZZER ON PHONE
CASH BOX CAUSE
OF TWO ARRESTS**

When Alarm Sounds Drug Clerk Locks Man and Wife in Booth and Calls Police.

COUPLE HAD TWO KEYS.

Traps Were Set After Failure to Solve Thefts of Thousands of Dollars.

In the arraignment to-day in West Side Police Court of a man and his wife, who were caught by an electrical "buzzer" device installed in a telephone booth, officers of the New York Telephone Company expect to solve the series of nickel-in-the-slot robberies which have cost the company thousands of dollars in the past two years.

The two are William Edward Barrett, an electrician, and his wife Tillie, who said they lived at No. 29 West Eighth-street. They were arrested in the pay booth in Pond's drug store, Broadway and Seventeenth street.

The police say that the names given by the couple are fictitious, also that the man is a victim of the morphine habit. When arraigned they waived examination and went to the Court of Special Sessions. They were unable to furnish bail.

The trouble with the slot boxes began with the prying off of the doors. Later when heavier boxes were installed boxes were removed from the booths, keys were made to fit them and the thievery continued. Inner boxes of steel were then installed, with more thefts, more keys and continued robberies. Then the buzzer device was hit upon and it caused the first arrest in connection with the thefts.

Buzzer Gave Alarm.
The coin treasury of the booth had been equipped with a wire connected with a buzzer behind the prescription counter.

Harold Cartwright was compounding medicines early last evening in the store when the buzzer sounded. Going out into the store he saw a man and woman in a "phone booth." The man was apparently "phoning" and the woman was standing up, with one hand on his shoulder. Cartwright locked the couple in the booth and called a policeman. Cartwright said that when he first saw the couple in the booth the outer shell had been removed from the coin box and the door of the inner or treasure box was open. When he unlocked the booth, and turned the couple over to the blue-coat the treasure box was closed and the outer shell in place.

"No crime, as you see, has been committed," said the man to Cartwright, according to the latter, but the clerk insisted on an arrest. Then the man said, according to Cartwright: "At least you can let my wife go. She has done nothing."

At the station house, the police say, they found on Barrett two worn bags, looking like coin bags, and \$1.10 in nickels, two dimes and two quarters. He had no paper money. In the muff of the woman the police say they found two peculiar keys. The police phoned to one of the telephone officials, Edward Bower, of No. 29 West One Hundred and Forty-second street, who went to the location with a lawyer named Wilson.

According to the police, Bower and Wilson took the two keys found in Mrs. Barrett's muff to Pond's drug store and found that they fitted the lock of the treasure box. The police said also that at the address given by the Barretts they could find no one who knew them.
