Metropolitan Opera House Crowded at a Revival of Wagner's Opera—A Chance for American Tenors.

MOST of us are prone to form conclusions from surface observations. Because some performances of Wagner's music dramas this season have not been well attended there has arisen an impression that German opera is no longer popular.

The revival served to reintroduce Berta Morena as Elizabeth and Carl Burrian as Tannhauser. The former, while not in her best voice, made an impressive picture of the saintly maiden in love with the wandering and faithless minstrel.

Carl Burrian is an excellent actor and a master of impersonation, as everybody who has seen his Herod in "Salome" knows, so his Tannhauser was dramatically effective, but his singing left as much to be desired as when he was here last. Yet he is acclaimed great in his own country, and what German tenor sings better?
