

BINGHAM TELLS THE ALDERMEN THAT HE IS BOSS

Brooklyn Can Not Have an Absolute Deputy While He Is Commissioner.

WILL NOT DIVIDE POWER

First Deputy Taken to Headquarters to Help Simplify the Work.

Police Commissioner Bingham's automobile dashed up to the City Hall today at 2 o'clock, and a minute later he had presented himself before the Police Committee of the Board of Aldermen with this salutation: "Well, gentlemen, here I am. Five ahead."

A number of members of the Aldermanic Board not on the committee, members of the Police Department past and present, and several taxpayers had preceded the Commissioner to the Aldermanic chamber. A front seat had been reserved for him.

Former First Deputy Police Commissioner O'Keefe, who is now a Civil Service Commissioner, having parted company after an official dispute with the Commissioner, was questioned by Chairman Bent before Gen. Bingham arrived. He told of the method of the police in photographing persons arrested and of the usual duties of a deputy.

Alderman James W. Redmond, of Brooklyn, made a statement apropos of the action of the Kings County Grand Jury in handing down a presentment against the Police Department following the action of the Commissioner in withdrawing his deputies from Brooklyn.

"We do not know what testimony was presented to that grand jury by Commissioner Bingham and Mayor McClellan, who were witnesses before that body," said Alderman Redmond. "If we must not have a new police headquarters branch and a real, genuine deputy in Brooklyn, we want to know the reason."

Bingham Is Heard.

"I am delighted to be here," said Commissioner Bingham, when he was called on, "but having no counsel may decline to answer certain questions. I make that reservation. I am thrilled by the patriotism of Alderman Redmond. They made a mistake when they didn't make Mr. York a full fledged Commissioner, but the only difficulty about that is that he and I could not serve together."

"Not on your life," came a voice. "I tried to get a building for Brooklyn but you Brooklynites fell down on the proposition. An absolute Deputy for Brooklyn is impossible under the law. As long as I am Police Commissioner I must be Commissioner, for I am in responsible command. As long as I am Commissioner there can never be an absolute Deputy in Brooklyn. I must control."

"It took me a couple of years to get round to this present size-up of my command."

"The main reason we brought the First Deputy over to Manhattan was because we needed a man to do the work. If I had asked for a Fifth Deputy I would have got the merry ha-ha."

"I do not regard Brooklyn as a waste station. I needed a man to help me carry the load and have arranged to carry it. This change worries a lot of people unnecessarily. I have made one bureau where two before existed. I've simplified things and am running with a reduced force. I've changed things, and our deputies are no longer sitting down doing nothing."

MOTHER IN CELL FOR NOT SENDING BOY TO SCHOOL

Pupils Laughed at Boy's Clothes; Too Poor to Buy Him New Ones.

Mrs. Ellen McGuire was fined \$3 in the West Side Court today for failing to send her thirteen-year-old son Johnny to school the first three class days of this week. She did not have the money and in default was locked up in the court prison.

Truant Officer Philbin, attached to the Board of Education, caused the arrest of Mrs. McGuire and also had little Johnny in court to verify his charges. Magistrate Cornell ordered the fine on the strength of Philbin's testimony.

To a reporter for The Evening World the woman in a cell told this story: "My husband, Dennis McGuire, has no regular employment and earns about \$10 a week as a substitute motorman. The last few weeks he has not been working and I have had a hard time managing to keep our little tenement apartment at No. 35 West Forty-eighth street."

"We have six children, all girls, except Willie, the eldest. He has not had a new suit of clothes in so long that I forgot the time and place of its purchase."

"He goes to public school, and on account of his shabby dress the other pupils laughed at him and poked fun at his tight-fitting jacket."

"Little Willie came home crying and said that he would run away if the boys at school continued to ridicule him. I then decided to keep the lad in the house until my husband found employment and we had money to provide my boy with decent clothes. His shoes were without heels and what was I to do?"

Late in the afternoon the story was told to Magistrate Cornell, who patronized Mrs. McGuire until Wednesday afternoon. She is ordered to pay the \$3 fine on that day.

On top of the family trouble now comes the \$3 fine, and Mrs. McGuire says she don't know where to get the money. The son, Willie, was allowed to go home and take care of his five younger sisters."
