

WARNS COLLEGE BALL PLAYERS OFF THE STREET

Magistrate Tells Prisoner They Are a Menace to the Public.

HE DODGED 2 BALLS.

Suggests That Teachers Give a Little Instruction in Law.

Magistrate House relieved his feelings of a lot of stored-up heat today regarding the terrorizing of the Washington Heights neighborhood by students of the City College. One of Dr. Finley's young men, George Goldberg, of No. 250 Broome street, was arrested yesterday for playing ball in

the street at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Convent avenue. "You instructors would do well to take a little time out of their labors with you on behalf of the classics and science and higher mathematics and devote a little time to telling you something about the city ordinances and the advisability and good citizenship of observing them," said the Magistrate when the youth was arraigned before him.

"I know that neighborhood. I tell you that the knights of medieval times who went abroad clad in steel armor, faced no greater perils than the unwary citizen who attempts to use his right to pass through the streets near the college. I narrowly escaped two baseballs myself yesterday. If one of them hits you, you might as well have been hit by a cannonball, for all the difference it would make.

"You have plenty of vacant land and you have fields reserved for athletics and ball playing. Use them. Let the streets alone. It is not only courtesy to fellow citizens, of which you college boys might profitably be taught much, but it is the law."

"There weren't many people on the street," mumbled the boy angrily. "That makes not the least bit of difference. The one citizen who happens along has as much right to safety as though he were a hundred citizens. You boys come up here and endanger the lives and property and comfort of people in a way that you wouldn't dare to try near your own homes."

Goldberg said he wouldn't ever do it again and that he would tell the college authorities what the Magistrate said. He was let go.
