

ALL SECAUCUS IS EXCITED OVER A SLANDER SUIT

"Val" Boulanger and "Pete" Farley Have Fallen Out and Partisans Are Locked Up.

ALL ARE FIGHTING MAD.

Horse That Draws Prisoners To Local Lockup Drops Dead From Overwork.

Valentine Boulanger, of Secaucus, has begun suit for \$5,000 damages against Peter Farley, of Secaucus. It is a slander suit and should be reached in the April term of the Supreme Court, that branch of the New Jersey Supreme Court that hears causes from North Hudson County.

The Boulanger-Farley action bids fair, we have it from a resident scribe of Secaucus, to become the cause celebre of that fair village, famed for its pigs and politics.

Already—says our Secaucus informant—there have been eleven personal encounters among Boulanger and Farley partisans. Feeling runs high and Dr. Ole Bolus is reaping a harvest. The two friends—"Val" and "Pete"—were descending pleasantly on pigs and politics in the parlor of the Sunnyside Hotel last Sunday night, when the chance remark referred to above was dropped.

Mr. Boulanger, who was formerly town clerk, provoked a scream of laughter by observing that it was mighty lucky for Secaucus that it was not cursed with muck-rakers and Lexow reformers. "Pete" Farley laughed as heartily as any of the others; then said playfully:

"And I guess it's mighty lucky, 'Val,' that none of those Lexow fellows didn't come over here."

But "Val" didn't laugh. Having delivered this snappy, "Pete" Farley opened wide his jaws and belched a heavy laugh. Several others laughed, but we regret to relate that "Val" Boulanger, the ex-town clerk, was not among them.

Mr. Boulanger turned what Secaucus calls a raw-beet red and began to beat his hands about wildly for air. He not only looked pained and hurt, but acted out the part by trying to lift a baby grand piano which stood in a corner of the hotel parlor and drop it on the still giggling Peter Farley.

He did not succeed with the piano in toto, but there will be testimony at the coming trial to prove that as Farley went out the parlor door two piano legs followed him, and that as he dashed up Main street, he was pursued by three stone splinters that narrowly missed his unharmed head.
