

CREW MUTINIES IN STORM; DRIVES SCHOONER ASHORE

Men in Panic on the Sinking Wishard Beach Her on Jersey Coast.

ALL HANDS MISSING. Vessel Had Been Running in Perilous Position Before All-Day Gale.

(Special to The Evening World.) ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Dec. 6.—Panic stricken sailors, driven to mutiny through fear that their decrepit craft would not live through the storm which has howled along the Jersey coast ever since Saturday night, deliberately drove the three-masted schooner L. S. Q. Wishard up on the treacherous sand bars off the mouth of Little Egg Harbor Inlet, where she lies to-day pounding to pieces.

Whether the crew escaped will not be known for several days. Not a sign of life was visible on board the schooner when coast-guards sighted her shortly after dawn to-day.

She first attracted the attention of the life-guard on Saturday morning, when she was seen running in the teeth of the northeaster. Her position aroused suspicion that there was trouble on board. The Brigantine Shoals along the Jersey coast extend five miles out to sea, and in rough weather captains keep well out to sea. Instead, the Wishard was running along inside the shoals not more than a mile from shore.

The coast guards expected to see her pile up on one of the hundred treacherous shoals at any moment, and word was being passed from station to station to keep a close watch. The northeaster continued to blow all day Sunday, and the Wishard disappeared until she was discovered in her present position and the life guards stationed here put out to her aid. There was nothing to rescue except a cat and a dog, which were the ship's mascots. The shallow waters of the inlet were strewn with wreckage, but no bodies were found floating nearby.

Some of the guards are loath to believe that the wrecking of the Wishard was due to panic. A Government investigation, it is believed, will shortly be ordered in order to fix the responsibility.

The Wishard, which has been in commission since 1874 is a three-master of 250 tons. Up to three years ago she was owned by Mansquan, N. J., but her present owner's name is unknown. Her master on this ill-starred voyage was Capt. Charles Gilbert.

The life guards who went aboard her to-day say that the schooner was unseaworthy. Her sails were patched and ragged, her woodwork rotten and her seams bulging wide open in several places.

TRIENNIAL SYNOD DISCUSSES POPE'S LAW OF REMOVAL

Archbishop Farley Presides Over 220 Church Dignitaries at the Cathedral.

Archbishop Farley presided over his bishops and priests at the thirteenth triennial synod of the Archdiocese of New York in the Cathedral to-day. The ceremonies opened early in the day with a solemn high mass and continued until the full ecclesiastical administration, except the four personal appointees—Bishop Cusack and Mera, Edwards, Money and Lavalle, comprising three vicar-generals and a chancellor—had been elected and installed in office.

The cathedral doors were closed except for the members of the archbishop's ecclesiastical family. Two hundred and twenty priests were present. After the solemn high mass a luncheon was served in the archbishop's home. Then followed the election of a diocesan-attorney, theological censor, Board of Censors, members of the Board of Examiners of the clergy, seven examiners of teachers, twenty rural deacons, eighteen members of the School Board, the Church Music Commission and the trustees of the Fund for Indigent Priests. In most instances the diocesan officers were re-elected.

The recent changes made in the canon law by the Consistorial Congregation at Rome, comprising an entire revision and codification of all canon laws governing the Catholic Church, including reforms in marriage laws, imposed special duties on the Synod. A feature of the "Maxima Cura," as Pope Pius's work is known, also deals with the removal of priests from office, affecting 300 bishops and 20,000 priests in

English-speaking countries alone. Under the new law a bishop may not remove a priest on his own initiative, but must act only for one or more of nine causes: perpetual insanity; untidiness or ignorance which renders him incapable; permanent physical or mental infirmity; animosity of his congregation; loss of reputation; seditious crimes; bad administration; gross neglect continued after warnings; disobedience of his bishop.

A vote was taken by the Synod on the recommendations of the Roman Consistory. The result is secret, and will be forwarded to the Congregation at once, as has been done or will be done in every diocese in America.

ROCKVILLE, Conn., Dec. 6.—George Andrews, Socialist, was elected to the Board of Aldermen in the city election here yesterday. He is the first Socialist to be elected to municipal office in this state.
