ZBYSKO FAILS TO THROW THREE MEN WITHIN HOUR

With Only Six Minutes Left, Giant Pole Proves Unable to Fell Americus.

Zbyszko, the Polish Giant, who has been matched to meet Hackenschmidt, the Russian Lion, in this city, lost his match at the wrestling carnival at the Grand Central Palace because he bit off more than he could chew.

Zbyszko thought that he would be able to throw three men inside of an hour, and judging by the way he disposed of Ivan Podowski in the opening contest it looked as though he might succeed, as it only took him four minutes and forty seconds to perform the stunt.

Yankee Rogers, the New England champion, was the next to grapple with the Pole, and after forty-nine minutes and twenty seconds he was pinned to the floor.

With only six minutes to go it was practically an impossibility to throw such a clever mat artist as Americus. The light heavyweight champion from Baltimore, Zbyszko exercised his wrestling knowledge and every ounce of force he possessed to live up to his agreement, but at the end of the allotted time he was still vainly struggling to gain a hold that would cause his adversary to fall.

William Demetral, the famous Greek champion, and John McLaughlin, of Brooklyn, were the pair that furnished the opening bout. Demetral was supposed to throw two men in forty minutes. At the end of fourteen minutes of hard work he scored a fall with a double-knee and lock hold.

John Lemm, the German champion, was pitted against Hans Lenert and he agreed to throw him twice within an hour. It only took him twelve minutes and ten seconds to accomplish his feat. Lenert then refused to continue the match, as he declared one of his ribs was broken when he fell.

Billy West, the local waterweight, made short work of Dodo Mahr in the main bout at the Long Acre A. C. stage, beating him so badly that the referee stopped the one-sided contest after about two minutes of fighting in the first round.
