

HER AUBURN HAIR LED BRITISHER AN ARDENT CHASE

Three Days After Meeting Janice Broderick Becomes Bride of Addison.

PALM BEACH ROMANCE.

Rapid Wooing Entertains Visitors at Resort—Bride a Former Actress.

PALM BEACH, Fla., Jan. 30.—Members of the social colony here have been highly entertained and amused over an ardent three-day courtship which, because the bride has auburn hair, resulted yesterday in a wedding. The contracting parties were Miss Janice Broderick, a former actress and shopgirl of No. 527 Valley street, South Orange, N. J., and an athletic young man who says he is Harry Deering G. Addison of Kent, England. They were married by the Rev. Charles Temple, D. D., of the Protestant Episcopal Church at Bethesda-by-the-Sea.

It was love at first sight, but not the bridegroom's first experience, as he admitted that since his arrival in this country he has been engaged on two previous occasions, but found that his erstwhile sweethearts accepted the attentions of other men at his expense. Bought Auburn Hair. Addison declares he is the son of William D. Addison of Riga, Russia; that his uncle is Sir George Holmes, Chairman of the Board of Public Works of Ireland, and that he is a cousin of Lord Berosford of the British navy. He told acquaintances at the Hotel Breakers, where he has been stopping, that he was educated at Radley College, Oxford, and was graduated in 1904. He claims to have excelled in athletic contests.

He came to Palm Beach from Jacksonville, where he told friends of his destination and declared that if he should meet a girl with auburn hair he knew he would marry her. The girl answering to the description chanced to be Miss Broderick, whom he met two days after his arrival. She was employed by Mrs. Nadia Sabbagh, Young Addison did not wait for an introduction and that night the couple were noticed strolling down the beach.

Hunt for a Minister. An immediate marriage was decided upon. Thursday morning Addison hurried to the golf links and asked an acquaintance if he would act as best man. The man agreed, but when introduced to the minister refused. The couple took a motor boat across Lake Worth, visited several jewelers in search of wedding rings and failing to find the proper sizes bought two aluminum plain band rings.

They then visited the Rev. Dr. Spencer, but the latter's son objected to the wedding, as he said his father was not familiar with the Florida laws. The couple next sought Dr. Henry, rector of Trinity Church at West Palm Beach. He also refused to perform the ceremony, asserting that he required some one to vouch for the couple.

Miss Broderick is a Catholic, and two priests learning this told her that she would be excommunicated if married without dispensation. The young couple persisted, however, and early yesterday morning appeared before the Rev. Dr. Temple, answered the necessary questions to his satisfaction and were united. They went to Miami for their honeymoon, and, according to Mr. Addison's plans, will proceed to Chicago, where the bridegroom will straighten out his financial affairs, after which they will go to England for the parental blessing.

"Travelled Over World." Information volunteered by Addison to acquaintances at the Hotel Breakers indicates that he was a young man of remarkable attainments. Besides winning many athletic trophies he boasted of being proficient in five languages. He has travelled all over the world, he declared. He said his father was president of several mercantile concerns in Russia and a director of the Northern Bank of Russia at St. Petersburg. He gave his address in Chicago as No. 1333 Jefferson avenue.

Miss Broderick formerly played small parts on the stage under the name of Miss Beverly. She appeared with Andrew Mack and Christie Macdonald in "The Prince of Bohemia" and also in "The Waltz Dream." In New York she gained some distinction as an artist's model.

Miss Broderick lived with her mother, Mrs. Anna Broderick, at No. 527 Valley street, South Orange, N. J. Her mother's ignorance of her daughter's marriage last night, declaring that Janice was on a trip for her health in Southern New York. She refused to state just where she was. She denied that her daughter had ever been a chorus girl, but admitted that she had been on the street.

ISLAND SINKS FIVE FEET AFTER AN ERUPTION.

Lava and Stones Thrown 3,000 Feet in the Air by Volcano Taal—332 Earth Shocks.

MANILA, Jan. 29.—Observers sent by the Bureau of Science to investigate the eruptions of the volcano Taal have telegraphed in a report that a terrific eruption occurred at 3 o'clock in the morning simultaneously with two prolonged earthquakes. The island on which the volcano is located sank five feet. A heavy mud shower fell and then for half an hour ash.

The observatory at Manila corroborates the report of the earthquake, having noted 332 shocks, and adds that a remarkable electrical storm continued two hours with deafening thunder within the smoke and gas umbrellas above the volcano. Lava and stones were belched 3,000 feet.

The constabulary assisted the panic-stricken natives.

One cavalryman was killed by the wreck of a house on the lake shore.

Following the sinking of the island a wave four feet high swept over the lake shore for a radius of a mile, destroying hundreds of bamboo shacks. These, however, had been evacuated on account of
