

STOLEN CHECK RAISED; TWO MEN NABBED AT BANK

One of Number From Theatrical Managers Taken From Mail Box.

THREE OTHERS PAID. Amounts Increased on All and Trust Companies Cashed Them.

Since Jan. 24, when the mail box of J. W. Young, a printer at No. 117 Chambers street, was robbed and checks from theatrical managers who pay for their printing on the twenty-third of each month were taken, the managers have looked with suspicion upon all checks as they came back from the bank.

Yesterday one was presented at the Commercial Trust Company, Broadway and Forty-second street, which, according to the bank officials, had originally been made out for \$25.25, but had been raised to \$75.

Two Men Arrested. It was stated by F. Howard Schnebbe as attorney for Henry B. Harris and, according to the bank, was one of those that had been stolen from Young's mail box.

Another Check Presented. Wednesday which the bank refused to pay. Mr. Harris was told of the occurrence and an investigation started.

One of the other theatrical men to suffer was H. E. Cooley, who used to be at the Circle Theatre and is now at the Broadway. Mr. Harris and Mr. Schnebbe said they understood that two of Mr. Cooley's checks, each made out for \$12.50, had been raised to \$125 and \$300 respectively and that the Hudson Trust Company had cashed both of them.
