

CHAMPION WOLGAST WILL MAKE HIS USUAL COMMENT WHEN IT'S OVER HE'S NOT IN CALIFORNIA.

To-Morrow Night's Bout at Fairmont A. C. a Contest Between Two Clever Men—Moran's Best Chance of Whipping McFarland Lies in Landing One Hard Wallop.

THIS classy bout comes off to-morrow night at the Fairmont A. C.—Packer McFarland vs. Owen Moran.

We've seen many exciting encounters during the past few weeks, but none like this. Brown and Moran and Wolgast have done their best to entertain, but good, rough fighters as they all are they figure as mere amateurs beside the boys who mingle to-morrow evening. Hogan, with his one year of fighting, Brown, with not much more, Wolgast, to whom the title "chess champion" seems to stick like tar and feathers, are novices beside the brilliant McFarland and the cunning Moran.

Packer McFarland, it is generally conceded, is as clever and aggressive a little fighting man as the present generation of fight fans can remember. In fact, I heard such a good deal of fighters as Tommy West say a couple of days ago that he considered McFarland the best man of his weight he had ever seen in a ring. "A real fighter," said Tommy, "not alone as good as the old timers, but better." Tommy compares him with Frank Erne at his best and declared that he thinks Packer could have beaten the great Joe Gans on the best day he ever saw, could have given Lavigne the fight of his life and handed the Hartigan and McFarland and Dally and all the rest of them like amateurs.

"He has everything," West says. "He is fast as lightning, knows everything any man needs to know about boxing, has a great head and is a natural, aggressive fighter."

I had a little talk with Sammy Kelly, once a boxer himself, Sammy, as Jack Goodman's manager, made a nice study of McFarland not long ago. "He's the best of them all—old or new," says Sam. "I don't know how good McFarland really is, because he has never been extended. Jack Goodman is clever, but Packer felled him out and made him forget everything he knew. Packer may have lost others off easy, but he won't lose Jack, and that night he showed more class than any other man I ever saw."

OWEN MORAN has class, too. He is clever. The fights between Moran and Abe Attell will not be forgotten for a long time. They were classic combats between the cleverest featherweights in the world. Owen grew out of the featherweight class, but he is a small lightweight still, and will give McFarland several pounds advantage in weight.

Owen has shown himself a rare combination of clever boxer and hard-hitting slugger. He is always dangerous. Moran is the only man who has actually knocked out Battling Nelson. Wolgast is technically entitled to a knockout, as the referee stopped the fight to save Nelson from a possible fatal injury. It must be remembered, for all that, that Nelson was never put off his feet by Wolgast, who couldn't stand the pace down even when Bat was standing on his hands and arms at his side. Of the K. O. at Moran's hands there can be no question. Nelson was felled cleanly several times in quick succession, and after the last knockdown the official ten seconds were counted before he rose to his feet.

Hilltop Youngsters Anxiously Await Start of Game With Veterans

Three Old-Timers Missing from Ranks at Athens, Ga., Training Camp.

WHEN the twelve Yanniham Hilltop and Rogues' Birds' crew went down to the dining room this morning for their cakes and coffee they were met by fifteen of the Rogues, who have been springing at Hot Springs, Va., for the past two weeks. Hal Chase was there with that smile he always wears, and anxious to know who was who of the youngsters, how they looked and who were the "finds." Arthur Irwin, chief scout, was there with the information, but Chase, having passed through Missouri several times on his way back and forth to the coast, had to be shown, and after the breakfast all hands jogged out to the baseball diamond.

Among the missing of the Rogues were Harry Weller, Charlie Hemphill and Earl Gardner. The first two thought they would need a few more balls before getting under the baking Georgia sun, so stayed in Virginia for a few days more. Gardner will not come South at all, because the Southern climate does not agree with him. He will join the team somewhere near the North, probably in Cincinnati, about April 1, the date set for the first game with Clark Griffin's National League hopes.

Chase had the boys "hurling a few" around the Springs, and said the boys were all feeling very fine and almost ready to go in a game. Great Irwin was there to press his challenge on behalf of the Yanniham, and if the fine weather of the early morning prevails this afternoon it is likely that the veterans and the newcomers will clash this afternoon.

There is one man of whom Chase and owner Frank Farrell think the world. He is Gene Elliott, the new third baseman. "He is a find," is the way Frank Farrell expressed it to Arthur Irwin in a telegram received yesterday. And Chase's dictum was all that is necessary. And if that game is played to-day, here is the way the regulars are going to line up: Elliott, third base; Hartzell, right field; Chase,

first base; Cree, left field; Knight, second base; Johnson, shortstop; Daniels, centre field; catcher and pitcher.

The Yanniham will use the same line-up they had in the game they played against the Georgia University team which they won by the score of 14 to 1.

Heat Keeps Players Indoors. It was one "Long Island" day as the Park Row boys call it for the Yanniham, sorbes, soups, coaches and others in this town yesterday. In the morning the leg weary boys took a cross-country walk of about six miles, and trainer Harry Lee showed the boys the scenery to make them forget their aching joints. But the afternoon was so hot that the shade of the hotel corridor was good enough for all hands. Some took their pans in hand and scribbled home of the time they were having. Others gathered a pinocchio and passed the paste boards around while others just read and read until Arthur Irwin called a halt lest they might dim the good batting eyes they are acquiring.

The Arrival of Louis Brockert. The arrival of Louis Brockert with his wife and three children did something to relieve the monotony, because Louis was on the stand for several hours telling all hands how everything was in America. Louis comes in the best of shape and is ready to pitch the game of his life, he says. If Brockert goes good, it is hard to figure just what Chase will do with the couple of good pitchers he has in the Yanniham camp now. They are all Ables and Dutch Revelle. These fellows appear good, but do not seem to have the stuff to carry more than eight pitchers, which will necessitate the sending out of either Revelle or Able. It will be a hard fight for the job, with everything favoring Able, on account of his being a southerner and of his size. If he can learn to field a little better, there is no doubt that he will be carried along, and at that it is likely that he will not stick, even though he will be the pitcher's last out to nine.

With the regulars, or rather, those who are called that because they have been with Chase at Hot Springs, and the twelve recruits who have been here all last week, the Hilltop squad only has four pitchers left.
