Henry's Ambition Is to Break Record for 100-Yard Dash.



"I'm sorry you didn't send up your card before you butted in on me. If I'd known a reporter was on my trail I certainly would have unpacked my trunk and put on a cowboy's outfit," said Gwinn Henry, the great sprinter from Texas, as he cautiously opened the door to his room in an uptown hotel last night.

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As soon as he entered college, and he is very proud of the fact that he was only outdoors in the trials to see who should represent Baylor, when Gwinn Henry scored half a point above him in the contest to see who should go to the national oratorical contests held at Greenville in 1907.

"The college people thought it was mighty funny that I could make such a showing as an orator. They couldn't see how a greenhorn fresh off a ranch could break the records for the 220 and the 100-yard dash. I had a quarter-mile race at the college and one other event were won by him that season.

"You see, I'd been training to trim that big brother of mine, and I had studied the whole thing out," said Henry last night. "He had become a dentist—Dr. Burk—but he could run like a prairie fire. When I returned home at the close of school I challenged him to run a hundred yards against me. Well, it was all I could do to beat him out a few inches, as we tried a quarter-mile race. Dr. Burk can travel that distance in world's record time right now. He won easily. If he wasn't too big a fellow, he could break the records for the 220 and the quarter-mile any time. He's the greatest runner I ever saw."

The next year, 1909, Gwinn and his brother brought two cattle trails together and made a dirt running track back of the ranch house. It was a little rough, but the keen competition inspired Gwinn's running immensely.

Henry's Tan Betrays Him.

Gwinn Henry, although born and raised on a Texas cattle ranch, does not in the least resemble the popular idea of a Panhandle cowpuncher. Any Texan is supposed to carry a large-sized silver star fastened to the front of his shirt in order that ordinary people may know he represents the "Lone Star State," but Gwinn believes the mid-winter tan he sports is a fair warning to the public that he comes from somewhere near the border line.

"When I was seven years old I could ride horseback all day," said Henry. "Everybody within a hundred miles of our ranch was a horseman in those days. I was so small that once I'd get astride I'd have to keep on the horse's back for the rest of the day or walk home. Many a time I've been thrown by a cow pony and had to hoof it ten or twelve miles back to the ranch. Perhaps that early training had something to do with my later success as a runner.

"I couldn't ride a cow pony without wearing spurs. Nobody ever attempted to saddle on one of our without a pair of spurs. They appealed some to a kid I had a pair big enough to stir an elephant out of a walk into a run. I got 'em from a Mexican peon who herded a couple of weeks for my father.

"As a kid I remember there were only about five families in our country. When there was a roundup I was always on the job. Sometimes we'd be camped out for a couple of weeks at a time. Lots of days I'd get all alone out on the range, but I didn't mind it much.

"There were any number of rattlesnakes in that country, and everybody felt it a duty to kill every one he saw. I was a small kid, but I never passed up the chance to put one of those nasty reptiles out of business. I've killed a bunch of 'em in my time.

"There wasn't much in the way of excitement for me when I was a kid. Texas, particularly the part I lived in, has always been very quiet. Riding over the range, herding and hunting was all I ever did up to the time when I started at college in the Howard Payne College at Brownwood. After that I became interested in amateur athletics, and he began to take on a sort of look for me."
